He pay us in crops. A truthful brother-in-law. The uncle - he robbed the land and can't sell it. It is fami ly land.

Wear the house we have pimento, bananas, bread fruit coffee, gungoo peas. We are tired of gungoo peas. I can sent ou some if you like. I like to give away. I want to have money to help others.

School career again.

When I was at school Inspector came. He said'I give them 10/ .- ; the teacher pu 5/ .- . (For an contenst examination prize.) he said: you are the three heroes of the class. (Including Campbell and two others.) He said:if28 parrots take 28 days from here to England, how long it would take for one parrot from here to Englan? I said : the same 28 days. He asked.... (something about a Prophet and the Angel which I couldn't catch) and I said : Jeraboh.

If I had done the worst thing at school - teacher

overlooked Campbell. I left school in 1938.

They let me sleep there and give me tea in the mor ning but no money - they were tight in their hand. At Way Pen also spent night at the police station and in the morning they give me tea. I stay there. First day I find no job, Se cond day I find no job. I have no friend there. The third day break found me with 9d. My God was so good. There was a gentleman. I said "Good morning Sir, ladies and gentlemen, also'. "Where are you from' . 'Trelawny' 'Which part' 'Warsop' 'I am looking for a job! (Can you read and write? ! Interview with Clinton Campbell. 10. IX.47. J.O.

Constitution of the family.

Following people constitute the fa household: Mary Campbell, ab. 47 years old. Cleveland Campbell, her eldest son, 27 years old. Clinton Campbell, next son, 25 years old. Basil Campbell, the youngest son, 20 years old. Inel Campbell, the only daughter staying at home, invalid /paralysed/,29 years old. Her two sons: waw Hugh /11 years/ and Delroy/9 years/ Woodfine. These two boys are sons of Haselton Woodfine, lawful son of Andrew Woodfine from his second marriage. He is now in Portland. "He went to Portland to work. He marry and his wife died." He does not come to Inel any more. "Round 7 years lived with Inel." He had no other children besides those who was were born by Inel. They parted some years ago: "they had some contention". little fighting." Haselton left his father's home, because k "he liked to exchange for the time." He may come back and expects to inherit from his patrimony.

Family land is composed of 3 parcels of different

Family farmy land.

size, all owned by their mother, Mary Campbell. They have I acre in the village around the house; then 5 acres "in Only 25/. are leftrownland", on Ginger River; this parcel was bought by to be paid still Mary Campbell from the Government in 1929. The third parcel is in Low River. It was inherited by his mother out of the property of 56 acres, to which 7 famileis had Elais for this land.

claims. His mother got 8 acres from this property, though it is doubtful whether kerxrights she exercizes full rights to this land. The land is wx is worked and utilised by some relatives of her. They pay for the use im of land in crops and cash. "Yam - we get from it. A don-key load each year. That is from for house provision, put away from what is sent to market. They pay for white what they sell. Sometime we get 30/., sometime 40/."

Family farm.

RemilyxfarmxThexxdoxfarminexby Actual farm land worked and cultivated by the family consists only of 6 acres. Out of this 6 acres only track the first par-3/4 acre is culti-cel /1 acre around the house/ is wader wholly, or almost vated in this par-wholly under cultivation. 5 acres on Ginger River are waix cel. cultivated only in part. Only about 1 and 1/2 acre is under cultivation. Around the house they have some cane /"only a few roots"/, bananas and ground-provisions. On Ginger River they have 3 breadfruits, and they had previuosly some coffee, but "coffee died out". They have also in Ginger River ab. 130 yam hills, ab. 200 cocoes and 300 badoes. Also bananas. He Clinton planted over there ab.125 roots of bananas.

The bananas on the family farm do not consist only 125 planted by Clinton. His brother Cleveland planted 130, and Basil 150. But he did not say whether these cultivations are near the house or on Ginger River.

Farming activities. How they are organised?

Work on the farm is organised in the following way. "Cleveland /the oldest brother/ is responsible for all the cultivations." But each of the brothers cultivates by himself and on his own account. Thus Clinton's cultivations consist 125 bananas recently planted and 30 yam hill: they include also a proportionnate amount of cocoes and badoes. Cleveland's contibution to the family farm is represented by 130 bananas, and Basil's - by 150. Clinton and Basil cultivate their ground provisions together: this item is represented by 100 yam-hills.

Each of the brothers makes his own cultivations on his own and they do not pool the in revenue from the sale of their products. They cover the expences of the enterprise from their own recources. They only contribute to the household expences in crops or money. There is no fixed amount to be paid furnithm by each of them furnithm to buy food an and to cover other expen running expences. They pay when they can and what they can. One day one of

brothers, another day - another one.

Work on farm.

Work on farm - owing to their separate enterprises is carried separately and they rarely unite for a common work. Whey are dispersed in their work not only because of this; also because they work from time to time for mixe other people. Again other people come to work on their fields in exchange for knexespexenseleraxion them a similar service rendered.

This can be illustrated by the following routine of work, which was kept and is expected to be held by Campbell-brothers this week.

Clinton.

Monday - He was "carrying shingles for Stephen White." 500 shingles were brought by him. He got for this 2/. and a meal /lunch/.

Tuesday .-Ditto. Wednesday -Ditto.

- He stays "home with my mother, because she is Thursday sick."

Friday -"Low River going on to look for the families." He will visit "two of my uncles, because they are sick." He goes to help them in the fieldwork: "to weed yams." He wont receive any mane money for this: "just meals over there". They always help each other: "close cooperation" between the families.

Saturady - He will return home from Low River.

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Cleveland.

"Worked with Thomas Barnes: Weeding ground." Monday -This was on the "day for day" basis - Thomas Barnes marked praviously for him. Got no mowill work next day ney for this; only had his mid-day meal on the spot.

Barnes come back to work with him on his cul-Tuesday tivations on at Ginger River.

Wednesday - Worked at Ginger River on his own cultivations planted bananas.

Worked with and for Alphous Campbell weeding Thursday -

yam. "Day for day" service. Worked at Ginger River - "planting bananas." "Stayed at home with my mother, cooking for my Saturday mother, because she is sick.'

Basil.

Monday - "Worked with Helwig White, breaking yam bar for him."/ploughing/. "Day for day."

"Went to Ginger River, planting hananas on his own cultivation."

Wednesday -"Went to work with Gladstone McLeish, weeding bananas. Day for day."

Thursday -"To-day will be at Ginger River, planting ba-nanas" on his own cultivation.

"Will be working with Gerald White - weed cane for money: 2/. and a meal."

Saturday - Again at Ginger River. Will be "weeding grass pn yam field."

Childrens work.

Hugh and Delroy go to the school regularly, but they works do also some worksmaxthax household work. They get every day at 5.30 a.m. Their first task is to bring water. "Morning - they carry water first, 6 buckets." Water s spring is not far from the known than known - "a couple of chains from the house." Then they get "bread and tea in the morning." After the breakfast they go to the school. At 12.30 p.m. they get another meal: Breadfruit, cocoe, yam and bananas - all cooked - and salt fish. After the meal they go again to the school. They are back about 5 p.m., when they get another meal -"just the same"as the midday meal. then they "study their lessons at 6 p.m. and got bed at 7 p.m. Go to sleep at seven."

This is their regular routine of day. Additionally "after coming back from the school they go shopping and sometime sent up to other people." On Fridays or Saturad ays they bring wood. Wood chiefly on Saturday, sometime

Friday." They do also shopping on these days.

Meals and homework.

Owing to work on other people's fields and for other people, the members of the family share only morning and evening meals, when they stay at home. They are "together at night only". Men have they midday meals at the place of their actual work or, when working on they own fields, sometimes have no midday meal at all. Nakxati thexmeheraxofxthexfamily Full course of three meals have only women staying at home: mother and sister of three bre thers. Sister's children have two meals daily not at home, but at their grandfather, Andrew Woodfine. They have at home only evening meal.

Meals are cooked either by mother or sister or one of the brothers. This happens when both women are sick and cannot do the cooking. One of the brothers stays then at home and cooks the midday meal. The everning meals are xix

are also cokked frequently by men.

taxtxweek This week the division of labour in the family we is the following:

Monday - "Monday evening I cooked the meal"/6linton/ - the meal was cooked of "food", fish and flour. Tuesday - "I cooked the meal - 1/. spent."

ditto Wednesday -

Thursday - "To-day I will cook the meal on the evening."

Friday

Basil will cook the meal. Saturady

Sunday

For the meals during the day sometimes 1/6, sometimes 2/. are spent. Last week money was given by Clinton. Cleveland did not give anything: "Cleveland did not have money anyway."

Plans for next week work. Day for day labour.

Plans for the next week are the following: "Next week my sister will cook the meal. Next week I will be carrying lumber for Stephen White all the week. Cleveland will be working - cultivating. Basil will be bouting cane with Gerald White - for him.

"Day for day" labour is we preferred than workingale ne on own field. "When he alone work, he dont do as much work, as if they work both of them."

Clinton's marriage. Clinton was about to marry a few years ago. It was when he expected to enter R.A.F. and passed all the tastax exams for it. When his blood was found positive and that hi and he was rejected from the service in R.A.F., his plans of the future career went down. He dropped his plan to marry and attacks incleaned nothing changed from that time. He would marry however if he could get a job. Otherwise he would not be able to cover the expences of the marital life. He will not marry until he will be able to provide his wife with everything which she needs for her exemples.

"I would'nt like her when I marry to go and weed grass for other people. I would like to make her happy."

"A girl expect good life. Good life seem to me: she have all that she need; have her home, have her clothing, and have her money to spend and make her happy; but not going and beg others."

Of course, people can marry even when they are poor. "If the wife is helpful in working, they can make life. She is working while man is working. She can plant cassava and yam hills and help him to weed the grass to save the expences. Out of the hundred, you will find 75% of that. Unless she is seamstress or a business woman."
