Family members.

The family is composed to-day of 10 people. There are 8 children to-day, 3 of who go to the school. The youngest, a boy is only ab. I year old. His brother next to him is between 2 and 3, and knexxiris next child is the girl of ab. 4. Other children as inxine above. Mrsx Miss Icilda was ill te-day and stayed not so much in bed as on bed. She went to the doctor yessterday and the doctor prescribed her medecine which she is taking. All this from wotking to-hard. Heart rouble and nerves. Mr. Eleazar Children at xchemient to the field - to weed bananas. Only Michael was in the school. Other school-age children could not go to the school to-day, because they have no cleths. They have only one Elsthxkaxbaxxarnxanxsuchxaccasianxxas one dress each which they take on when they go to the school, but the dress must be washed and pressed on Sutur-

day or Sunday. Tixi Miss Icilda could mak get no seap last week and so the children could not go to the school. They will go next week, if it will possible to get any

Miss Icilda was not born in Warsop. She was born in Ulster Spring, from where she came to live in Allsides about 20 years ago, when she was 18. She came here to gether with her mether and her stepfather. She was the first child of her mether, bern before he mether married another man. Her mother's name is Palmer - she lives in a shingle house to the right from the Allsides Rd going to Albert Town, a little above Charles Campbell's grass-house. Her mother had altegether 8 children. The Miss Icilda has 3 sisters and 4 brothers. Her sisters do not live in Allsides or Warsop. They went to live in towns - one in Kingsten etc. Only her brothers stay here and they live with the mother. The eldest is 22 and the youngest only 13.

When her mother came to live here in Allsid s, xho they rented first of all a pice of land on the other side of the Allsides preperty /Office House/. Florence Easen mother of her husband lived also in semewhere there. They werent kari their direct neighbours, but when going to she shop Miss Icilda used to pass through their yard. InxibisxwayxshexmeixE

In this way she met her future husband, Eleazar Spencer.

She married him wimmskrim shortly after she came to live in Allsides. It was 18 years age - she was 18 at that time. She kad started to bear children since she was 18. Eleazar built the house on the same spot where they live to-day and they moved to live here to-gether. She had altogether 11 children, but only 8 are alive. She never had any children by any other man. She does not believe in living with more than one man. If people, who started to live together, part, it is frequently because we /s.i.e. women/ are guilty".

Their house.

The house was bult 18 years ago . From that time it was damaged and repaired many times, but tey never get any help to improve or repair their house. Even after 1944 hurricane. But the house is more less like that which

they built 18 years ago.

It is a wattle house with a thatch and only very xezhii scanty grass-covering on the walls. The house has no floor - just earth-floor. Xixkaa Neither it has any windows. Two doors are leading to the house: one through the front-, and another through the side-wall. In front of their house a nicely kept rese-garden is planted -

just to adorn the house.

The furniture is very peer and simple. A grass-parti tion divides the kouse into two miniscule rooms. Inxthex first was The first one, which can be eneterd by the front door, is her husband's room. There is one wooden chair /very rude and simple/ in this reem - it serves chiefly for the purposes of prolongating the bed. A small table is covered with a very poor cellection of glassware. The reamainder of the room at the back-wall is taken by the bed. The bed is made just of a wooden platform supported by a wooden box on the outer side, and by some wooden structure oux at the opposite side. Tixxxxxxx It was covered with a sheet, but there was evidently no blanket. One tiny pillow served Mrsxx Miss Icilda to support her head. She was lying on the bed dressed, kepeing the youngest child hazieda besides her. Anxihisyxban This bed serves as Miss Icilda explained me her housband and two erxthreexe of their boys. She slepps in another compartment, where a similar structure serves her as a bed. She and her six daughters and youngest sons are crowded maxtha ever there xxx in thenight. "Just like pins - we cannot even turn".

Poverty.

They are very poor, cannot afford to build any better house. Cannet even afford buying hecessary cleths. Mix Miss Icilda has shown me two pairs of old shoes, whichx really xissked xaxxif xreeman one of which was really impress sive for its main heles. But Miss Icilda was of an apai opinion that they are quite good, need only some reapair. Of course, the front part, she said must be thrown away, but the back part is still he althy. If only she could repair them. Shaxax Another pair was much better, wasx Evidentlyxalan

and there was no disagreement as to whether it can xarva be repaired. Younger children were rather nicely dressed but the older one - Gynthia and Reginald - were ordinary working attire - dirtied and tern.

Meals.

We had a talk over how Miss Icilda manages to feed her children. Children de not get any fresh milk. Frem t time to time she buys tinned milk for the youngest one - about I tin per week. It was a blessing when one could get such me a tin fer 3d. from Miss Eda. Unfertunately it is only for the babies - Willy, who is about 3, wetx zen cannot get this milk for himself. Zhaxkususxthat She has no cow and no goat, so other children are fed simply on Karand "ground food". She knows that Willy is tax really too you g for this fast food, but what else can she do? The usual course of meals which children get are: merning tea, made of a bush imitadxwith which is boiled and the drink is sweetened with sugar. Usually children must be satisfied only with such a drink on the merning, they do not get anything to eat. Transfirstassistassistas breakfasia antice ensists Or they get some bananas to it, if there are any. Their first solid meal is breakfast, for which "food" is cooked. The She tries to season this f dish with some coco-nut oil, some butter or some fish. if she has some spare money to buy it. But frequently children was - even the youngest ones - must be satisfied just with the "bare feed" in "bare water". Is she has any money, she buys flour to mix it with the "food" and make it more neurishing. Usually two pounds of flour make amount sufficient to be used for brekfast and fer dinner and if she has money to buy something in the shep she buys most frequently flour. It If it were for her only, she might prefer milk or fish instead of flanr. But elder children, these whe go to the school and work in the fields or around the house, prefer sometheing xxiii solid. Food mixed with flour is what they like the best and what satisfies their hunger. If she has te sper one shilling max in the shop, it the best calculation is to buy flour - two pounds or a little less - and the remainder can be spent on butter or oil. If she spent Axper 9d. on a tin of milk, little would be left to add to thei meal something solid to make it satisfactory. She wax must spend usually one shilling daily on what she buys ir the shop, but only 3 shillings would be enough to buy eve rything they mandxandxford really need.

The farm.

They have no buy-land and live from what they rent Their rent-land consists altogether of 2 and 1/2 acres in 3 parcels. Half an acre around the house and two parcels, one acre meach, in mixer two different places in Allsides. This land thery rented for years, but previouslit was manking estimated only as two acres. But Sir Archibald ordered land survey some 4 years /?/ ago and it was found that this they utilised for 4 years an area of 2 and 1/2 acres paying all the time only for 2 acres.

In 1944, after the hurricane, people went to Sir Archibald to ask him to cancel their debts. But Sir Archibald refuse and warned them that every penny of what they owe for the hidden arreage must be paid.

They were ordered to pay new for 2 and 1/2 acre, to pay off 4 years rent for half an acre for which they did not pay, and the rent was raised from 24/. to 52/. So now they must pay L.4 yearly for the land they rent. It wouldn't be so bad if there they could get some an employment on the property to be able to earn a little money and pay their rent from these earnings. Unfortunately the extate and no employment is offered to people. They /the estate people only press their rent and send all the meney to the bank, but don't the use it on the spet. That is why it is so difficult for the people who live in Allsides.

In olden times, when she settled down with her mother in Allsides, it was much easier to live here. People used to keep as much as 4, 10, 16 and more acres and pay only for the half of what they actually utilised. There were many people at Allsides at that time, when she came in, and many people lived in Allsides previuesly. But many of them dide, many left the place when they acquired their buy-land, and in this way new-comers could take some land left by them and grown with grass or bue shes. The iznayxxkeraxikexx spet, where they built their house, was one of such places. Before they took it, it was rented by somebedy who died, and the place was left resting until they took it. People at these times never worked the same land year after year. They moved from one place to another after one year or se, and paid for what they actually cultivated. To-day they must pay for all the land they utilise - not for what they actually cultivate. And they must always keep one field resting when other is under yens and ground previsions. The soil is very tired and they can net use it year after year. After one year they must take another plet. They manure the land spreading the grass ever the ground and tx tying up the stock in the field which is resting. Still it does not help much. And a part of the land they rent is so stony that they have no use of it at all. But they must pay the rent fer all the area.

They plant on their farmland cane 2 about an acre, some bananas, but only little vam and pushe petatees and other groundprovisions. She could not tell how much land is under separate cultivations. They have some bananas, but only few were fruiting. Panama disease. This year her husband planted some more bananas, but they don't know whether they will be spared by disease.

Work.

All the work in the field is done chiefly by her husband. She helps him with catch-crops - peatees, peas and so on. She does also weeding. Besides she has a let of work at the house - with the children and with cooking for all the family. When she goes to do some work in the field, still the evening meal must be cooked by her. Children are helping her in work. Cnythia for inatance is cooking their breakfast to-day. Reginald is also helpful. But other children are still to small. And besides, the bigger ones go still to the school.

Her hushand employs from time to time some workers
- especially at planting yams. This work hardly can be done
done by single man. The soil is very heavy - clay - and
sometimes no more than 10 yam holes can be dug in a day.
Then the mp holes must be left open for some time known
ime and the soil burned by the sun. To do all this in correct time for planting all the yams in one time, more
than one man's work is needed. That's why they must employ people if even they havent got land enough to feed

themselves.

Daughter in Kingsten. Her eldest daughter does not stay with them. She left about two year age, when she went to work as \*\*\*mentia\* servant to Ulster Spring to a redative. But the \*\*\*man man went to work in America and then her daughter went to Kingsten. She stayed there at a place whre she earned 7 shillings per week. Then she left this job, found another and changed againg the job for a next one. Miss Icilda does not know hom much does she \*\*\*mention\*\* earns now. She wrote her recently; she feels bad and probably will leave her work for some weeks to get rest.
