A young woman standing in front of the house ~~down the~~
~~at the path leading from the Allside road down the Wilson Valley~~ /first house
 along the path leading down the Wilson Valley from the
 Allside road near the Chinese shop/ gave her name as Mrs.
 Campbell; ~~said and said that she is the daughter~~ from
 the conversation which followed I learned that she is the
 daughter of Mr. Seivwright, the owner of the house.

The house /wooden, shingled/ was built 12 years ago
 by her father. Her father came to Warsop from Ulster ~~Spring~~
 Spring when he owned a previously a small piece of land
 not very near to the road. Her mother is also from Ulster
 Spring.

Mr. Seivwright settled down in Warsop in 1918, but his
 family ~~stayed in the~~ joined him later. Her mother stayed
 for some time in Ulster Spring and she herself was born
 /after 1918/ in the same place.

He bought first of all a small piece of land adjacent
 to the road and there his first house was built. ~~He lives~~
 He owns this house to day - it is the house which is ~~rented~~
 rented to Mr. Williams, the cabinet maker. Only later on,
 when he ~~built more~~ bought more land he built ~~the~~
 the new house in which they live to-day. Her fathers pro-
 perty is in two pieces: the one the road /the shop in which
 the cabinet maker resides/ and another, bigger, where
 their living house stands. Both pieces are divided by a
 plot of land which is owned by Mr. Lin/Lue/ the Chinese
 shopkeeper. The small hut /Wattle and thatch/ between
 two pieces of their property is on the land which the Chi-
 na-man sold to a man.

Mrs. Campbell has three children.

Her mother died "one month ago to-morrow". There is
 a fresh earth-grave in the family graveyard - this is the
 grave of her late mother. The mortar-tomb in the grave-
 yard is that of her sister. She died 1936 together with her
 baby six days after the birth. The small stone-tomb is th
 that of the baby. On the stone head of the mortar tomb th
 only inscription which could be read was: "Aldine" - it

was given as the name of her sister. ~~The tomb was made on her father's order by a man from U. Sprin.~~ ~~er~~

During our conversation two girls were ~~asking~~ watching us through an open window. One of them of ab. 16-17 years had ~~pink~~ red-purple, newly dyed nails, straightened hair one eye blind. Asked about the eye said "a pocket knife from ginger-beer hit her". She was sister-in-law to Mrs. ~~Xampbe~~. She does a little ~~house~~ work - sewing.
