Elliott is the youngest brother of Mrs. Emma Linton. He even considers her as his mother. His own mother (and Emma's) died when he was very small and Emma brought him up and he called her "mamma".

He is the chief carpenter at the factory. He works there almost continuously but is paid by job. He does not want to give the factory all his time. Suppose a friend died and wants a coffin - Calbert wants to be able to make a few things for his friends and neighbours when they need his services - thats why - he says - he does not want to work exclusively for the factory.

Farming& children.

inxianxx Round 1936 he had only 21 acres of land - but (as seen by Census) he acquired a fair portion in the next few years. Two of his sons have been in the USA. They keep their economies in the bank - did not buy land yet. They plant their tomatoes on father's landand also on shares on other people's fields. It seems that aniel and Calvin are his outside sons. His family is so numerous that it is difficult to follow their story at first - and he suses their nicknames.

Kenrick Elliott said he is about 16, and is the 7the son to his mother and father. His father has 9 children with his mother. Daniel and May are two children of another union. Daniel is his father's oldest child. 'e did not give May's age or the time of her birth. She has married Errol Elliott of Ball Ballards Valley. he shares house with her husband in Ballards Valley.

Daniel is also married and lives on his father's

Mrs. Estella Elliott was born in Dunder Hill. She married his father there before coming to kinks share house with him in Bull Savannah. His father was born in Bull Savannah: -his father's father and mother also.

All his borthers engage in tomato planting from on his father's land. They save themselves, the money earned from the reapings, to buy their own clothes.

Kenrick was picking some of the tomatoes from his field at the time of the interview. He plants on about 2½ squares. In the first picking done about a fortnight ago he got about 5 boxes of fruit for which he recieved £1. 19/- At the time the interview was given he had almost completed picking and had 12 full boxes of what he said was first class fruit.

He was is helped in his tomato cultivation by his brothers Fredrico and Calvin. He returns whate ever help he gets from them. Alvin's field is at about 8 squares.

Marriage of Calvin Elliott

Dudley edvise Simpson informed there is a wedding over the hills, and volunteered to take me there. He guided me there, -left me.

The Wedding scene

A car was parked kataraxthaxtalxinisxhamaaxxx before Calvin's house in the unfinished road to Ballards Valley. There were groups of people standing in the yard, and some in Calvin's 2 roomed house. A number of people were standing round a gramaphone being played in the yard. In a clearing in the yard there was a booth made of bamboo./entirely open at the sides and was covered over with a traupauling. Under this shed, was a long improvised table with some seating accommodations around it.

Calvin and his wife had just returned from Mamp Mandeville when I arrived. This wife was Delva Bent. She came from Queensberry to work at the factory, about a month age. Calvin had seen her, fallen in love with her, and decided to marry her in this period. Delva's father is dead, but her mother sisters and some aunts and an uncle were ax on the scene.

The couple had not married in church; they had gone to the registrar's at Mandeville. They had not married in Bull Savannah because it would have taken too much time to get the bans publised etc. There is no marriage officer in Bull Savannah.

Calvin came shyly out of his house, accompanied by his wife. He wore a blue tweed suit, sport shoes, and a white pon-pon in the lapel of his coat. Behind came Errol Elliott accompanied by a woman -probably his wife. As Calvin passed by the group in which I was standing somebody remarked asked him if he was not taking his ladys arm. Errol embraced the woman walking beside him, but Calvin only smiled and continued to walk towards the shed for which he was making.

The wedding table

The wedding table had by then been laid out by Miss Jude (Mrs. Judith Kochester) On it were decahters of wine, the wedding cake, slabs of watermelon fancifully cut, oranges and ripe bananas. The couple seated themselves at one end of the table, friends and relatives

took the other seats around. Miss Jude then call upon Errol Elliott the master of ceremonies, to take charge.

Errol congratulated the couple for getting married.

He hoped he said that the wedding was to prove "a happy beginning to a happy ending"." There was a chorus of Hear! hear! " Continuing he addressed the groom as - "Mr Bride; charged the groom to love his wife with all the devotion he is capable of. Errol repeated these good wishes a number of times. Each time he used different words to say it. Loud cries of "hear, hear! " greeted each new effort he made.

Merton Francis took up where Errol left off. He began by wishing the couple happiness. "I envy you." If the taking ladies of Bull Savannah are all as nice as they look, I suspect there will soon be a lot of other marriages."—
Cries mg of "hear!, "He would ask every one to "stand up and drink to the happiness of Mr and Mrs Elliott."

Mrs Estelle Elliott then held her small glass of wine on high declaring as she did so -"All I have to say is"In God we Trust". She was appluaded.

The cutting of the cake was done by Lyn Bent sister of the bride and Ethlyn Dyer daughter to Crofton and Icy Dyer. While the instructions were being given for the start of thes cake cutting race, Mr Calbert suddenly and dramatically announced "a dollar the cake don't cut." He put the dollar (4/-) in a saucer Miss Jude quickly made available . Hardly had he finished speaking when Charlie Rochester kt bet him" 5/- the cake mus' cut". A Mr Ernest Faulkner ther put up an additional 4/- that the cake must cut". Mr Merton Francis in turn put up 4/- " it must not cut ." Mr Calbert added 10/- more against the cutting , but Isaac Elliott came forward with 2/- fer the cutting. Nobody else having put up any money against the cutting, it was decided the cake would be cut. Errol resumed his directions for the start of the race then. At the count of three they cut with energy. Ethlyn Dyer, won Miss Jude decided, when Erral seemed undecaded . (The cake was a small three storied affair, standing perhaps a foot high.)

An elderly man bent low over her talking taxkar earnestly into her face. He seemed to be counselling her; she listened without/any signs of boredom or fatigue.

Miss Jude's sister Vie Lynton was one of the people *** remaining around the table. She ** described the wedding *** -- "A kind off haphazzard thing y'u know!" Asked, how was that? she explained -"Well y'u know, the fellow seemed to have been dying for a wife; he could not wait... was dying to hold a woman.

I was invited into a room turned into a bar for the occasion. In this room, were a number of bottles of aerated water and rum. I was given some rum and ginger.

The house of Calbert Elliott is just behind the house of his late father Charles Elliott. It is a two-room that ched house. The lower half is painted blue. The building looks modest especially against the much higher and covered with a red roof house of father. But the furniture is very good, with all fancy additions as china cabinet etc.

Their kitchen is rather far not in this yard.

(The "yard" is formed by the father's house - where "hoda Elliott lives at present - Rhoda's kitchen - in which she cooks alone - and Galbert's house)

It was for the first time that I met Estheline. Calbert Elliott visited us on many occasions. He is the uncle of Judith "ochester with whom he was brought up together by his sister and Judith's mother Emma Linton.

His land. According to Estheline Calbert bought from his father 2 acres of home land and 12 acres from Gvnt in Duff House for 2vl2xx £ 70. However I do not think the information about the home land is correct. I was told by Calbert's brothers Moses and Cornelius that each child of Charles and Judith Elliott got 2½ ac. of the family land. Iter the deatch of Charles Calbert got the old home with the 2½ acres additional as the youngest son On the other hand it seems that Merton Francis got from his grandfather Charles 2 or 2½ acres, which would mean that there were no acres left after Charles' death. About his land see also FrR. 21 part re. "Story of Family and land."

Calbert has at any rate 14 acrea of land, which is cultivated almost exclusively by his sons.

He was a young boy then (it was at the time he had his first outside child). "e earned a "good money" there for which he built his house.

At present he is employed as chief carpenter in the factory and tukesvaluexx works also at building private houses. He directs a whole "gang" of carpenters & associates.

Addition re children.

Calbert Elitit had another outside child: a daughter called Mae with ris Lawrence who lives in "idge.
This daughter Mae is married now to Erroll Elliott and they live in Ballards Valley.

Errol Elliott bought a piece of land in Thatch Walk from harlie Thompson and is building his house there. The house will be soon finished and Mae with her husband will come to live in Bull Savannah.

Estheline says she had no outside children.

Visiting her married sons I found Esthella in her kitchen. During the previous interview we talked outside her home, from which the kitchen is rather far. Esthella was busy washing in the company of her youngest daughter in law the wife of Calvin Veta.

The washing was done under a small square shed which serves for household activities. The kitchen is in a separate building, it is rather small and badly equiped. There is another one room-house. "It is my little house" told me firs. Estheline. It serves as sleeping quarters for some of the boys.

In the middle of the shed was a milittle shelf on a leg on which stood a cage with a green parrot. This was bought recently by Mrs. Elliott in Santa Cruz for 4/-. The bird had hot peppers in the cage and enguaded them very much. It doesn't talk but Mrs. Elliott will teach it.

Occupations of sons.

All sons a part from cultivating "try a trade".

Damien and Calvin are also carpenters. They work at present in the fathe 's "gang" at the factory. Ricardo is a tailor. Moralis is a shoemaker. A third son is also carpenter, but I didn't get the name.
