Sinclair Isaac: "Uncle Usine".
His land.

Sinclair Isaac is known in the neighbourhood under his nickname "Uncle Usine". He is an old man - brother of old James Sinclair, "the old patriarch". His father was fisherman - he had only little

His father was fisherman - he had only little land, which was passed on to his brother James Sinclair. We Usine in his young days took anxerex into possession and cultivated or utilised a piece of land in the Ridge. It was still before land was surveyed and any land titles acquired by the inhabitants of the district. After the survey he got only small piece of 5 acres, for which he paid taxes. In this way his land possessions were reduced to the size of 5 acres only. Maxmaran Never in his life he bought more land. His father had no land on the Ridge - all his father's land was in Ribbit.

His wife Florence.

His wife Florence "she was mixer sister of old George Powell wife, Frederica Powell. I dont know her name. One of her brother was Dyer /Frederica's/, but I dont know whether the same father."

Their children.

Their children stay with the parents. "All of them live with him, living in him father home."

Arthur Sinclair.

"Arthur get an old man and him have no wife, never have no wife, and I know of no girl griend him have."

Urel Sinclair.

"Another one - Urel - him have girl by name Ruby Rochester. She is daughter of Agnes Dyer /and late Arnold Rochester. But the girl - she living now with a man in Manchester. So Urel have no girl friend now - all alone. Ruby have one child for him. The father took it."

INTERVIEW WITH ISAAC SINCLAIR.

Mr. Isaac 80 "was born and bred and live same place" - Ridge. His mother and father died "years and years now when" he was a child.

His lands,

This is 5 acres. He acquired the lands as follows:

Initially he had 13 acres but due to the "difficulty of times, a had to sell 8 acres, leaving mi with 5." He used the money he got from the sale of the 8 acres to pay off the ten years money due on the 5 acres. He was forced to do that because on the 10 years allowed him by the Government to pay for the whole 13 acres had about elapsed; he was advised by Mr. Charles King, now dead, to well some of his holding so as to save some of it. Mr. Charles King was the Government agent in charge of Crown lands in the area. He sold the 8 acres to a man named Samxxxx Rowe. Roye in turn sold the land to the ompany. Roye had died.

Mr. Isaac called "Uncle Usine" evaded telling how much he sold the land for; - "It was hardly anything. Land don't value much in those times."

His cultintiobs:

He used to cultivate tobacco chiefly in those times. Sually he planted about 1000 holes; this did not vover an acre. He also use to plant cassava, sweet potatoes, yams, "and a little peas, but not much of that.: He used to sell only his but not much of that.: He used to sell only his tobacco crops. During the tomato crop just past Arthur cultivated about 2 square chains of tomatoes, xxix Euriel it 1 sq. chain.

"Whatever them give mi a satisfy. Them pay the saxes and so on ." Taxes are due on the 4th of this month.

In the 2 square chains area on which he had p planted tomatoes, Arthur now has cassava inspersed interspersed with red peas, the latter called french beans. Euriel has done likewise on his plot.


Mr. Idaac has planted a few sq.yds. of cassawa in one plot and eskallion in another. Encouraged by last night's good showers, he was sticking in a few "cassava sticks" between the eskellion. He would like to exgend his cultivations, but can not get enough grass to do so. He has about 3 squares of level land under grass. He expects his so son to chop out the trees now grown on the rocky hill side. They will burn the land after. Guinea grass will grow there after the burning. He will not have to plant the grass.

He has 2 hands and a pig. He bought the pig recently for 24/-. If The purchase was not mae from tomatoe money.

of the tomatoe money he says "Thelittle money I get from me so sons, a have to go and pay the taxes out a it, and a owe a littles shop bill you know; have to put way something for sickness to'." Tomatoe help people to do little better with you wearing ((clothes) to sendy you child to school and so nn. Help you well with yo eating too especially when food run out and you have to buy the little dear flour."



"My food is the bammy. When I eat the flour is only for ration. When y'u out of cassava, y'u don't net have nothing; It is the keeping up of every home."

He eats the bammy with fresh fish, "and sometimes a little pound of beef; sometimes y'u get a little grains (congo peas) to help y'u on, or some saltthing from the shop."

"Salthing is a shaky meal -poor meal!" Saltthing is saltfish. Those pickle fish mi don't x
scarcely eat -the mackerel and herring. When you
do buy the herring picklefish, y'u have to buy
the coconut oil to' -more money spen' and not
such a good meal."

Complaints

His sons Euriel and Arthur joined us here. While they stood listening he said -"The trouble as the present time is that people have no land room, to cultivate and raise. (Raise stock) In older days, all these space (he made a sweeping gesture with his hand bhen) belong to one man. Y'u could raise, kill y'u goat -you pig, get meat to eat, but this time, this last time now, if they kill goat, pig or cow, y'u havek to pay 1/- for a pound."

"It, much harder now. If y'u home have 4 big man, an you have a wife an' a picknie, an' you buy a pound of meat, what it do? -it dont even give y'u a good meal."

Arthur added: "Some of the bigger man them inhabit up the whole of the land, and leave the poorer one them to kotch/ina little earner surface."

more than if y'u owe a little taxes them come scrape up y'u goat or pig, cow -anything; them level (levy) on it for taxes.

Issac: -"An' when them make that level, y'u still have to pay the taxes!"

Arthur: -"Take for instance, look on the little piece of land wey (where) 11 people settle on! It too thickly settle!! Y'u don't have noh play. (i.e. You have no play.) If y'u bring even a fowl come a y'u yard it gone into the other yard."

Asked whether the cultivation of tomatoes had brought any change in kix purchasing power, Arthur answering for the group said -"Tomatoes give us a

few shillings more so that a can buy a little stock or so, but land get so dear now that if y'u get even a £20 from y'u crop it can't buy an acre of land."

Arthur: He has not yet bought any stock from the xaz with the money obtained from the sale of this tomatoes, intends to buy a goat or a sheep.

He is a cultivator, he earns his living from what he plants. The most of his cultivation is done in the woods. The Ex-service men from May Pen and other places "have got land from the Government to cultivate Those men who got the land have given the land to men from Bull Savannah to work for them. Phillip Sinclair is in maxs charge of a portion of the land. Phiblip gives smaller plots of the land out to a few max men that he knows, and Arthur is one of them.

When the crop is reaped Arthur gets two thirds and the owner gets a third. The chief things that he plant are cassava and peas. Arthur contributes to his father house hold. There are two houses in the yard, but there is one house hold. Arthur and his brothers, Urel and Fagus live in one house while the father, and mother, Icybelle, and Linda live inthe other. Arthur does not have a girl friend or any children.

He does the same kind of work as Arthur, also Ras Fagus. They all work with Phillip as the supervisor. Urel and Fagus contribute to the house hold also. Neither Urel nor Fagus has a girl friend. Isaac had eleves children, three are dead and two are alive. Two of the children are in Glarendon, one in Manchester one marry and live at Dundar Hill, and four live at home.

She has a child for Isaac Sinclair, son of Phillip Sinclair, I Isaac started to support the child, "but stop/people carry lie and story say the pickney a no fe Isaac, a fe Henry Ford. "We never run up and down and listen to big people business as how me see pickney do now a days. When we parents dey talk we have fe go vay go paay or do we duty, and enly go when them call we. Them ya pickney no want till them call them, them in a the middle dey listen to every thing. The bible say fe train a child when him young amak the way he should walkand when he is grown him a won' depart from it".

"G words wey me hear pickney talk before big people now, you thing we could a talk the m dey words make we parents hear, we mu never even know them. The world really coming to the end. Jesus say when the end is near all this will happen, a so a the bible dey fulfil ".
