Our meeting was very short: Editott accompanied us to our walk through Thatch Walk to show us his tomato garden and to introduce us to some families. We noticed that the d families he seleted were the poor ones and it seems that his aim was to induce us to xome give some help to our new acquainatnees. We visited with him Caroline and Sarah Heath where we met his mother Adina Elliott.

Adolphous Ellintz wanted us to visit also Jane Brown, whom he recommended as xaxxxxxxx the blind woman and very poor. We postponed our visit and Elliott left when we were having a talk with Mrs. Senior, wife of Eustace Senior.

He showed us "his" garden. It was a nice garden of about 2000 plants. Therexxx The fruit was just maturing - no picking was so fare done mathiaxfisher in this field. Rexxxxxished He conceded that the garden is not so much his own. He does it on share "xith - with Ira /? or Erold?/ Eliiott. He does not pick than tomatoes which are already almost ready for picking. Waits till the coop will be bigger: Kraxmake "To have one heavy ship to make crop".

Interview with Maud Elliott

Maud is one of six sisters who with a half sister share haose with their brother Canute Elliott. Hubert the eldest and only other brother to these sisters lives in his own house built on the premises. The land on which the land-is/built is jointly owned by bothers and sisters the daughters and sons to mother Emelia Rowe and father Henry Elliott.

The sisters with whom Maud shares house she lists as follows:

1. Maud Elliott (herwelf)

2. Vernice Elliott

3. Poris Elliott

5. Martena Elliott.

6. Doris "

7. Rebecca " (father's daughter end)

For details of other relatives Mand referred me to her eldest brother Hubert. Hebert she said "is the Head;" Later she corrected this somewhat to include anute whose she says the land is registered. he was somewhat uncertain about this, or perhaps seemed so, because she was somewhat reluctar to give much inforamation, feelingthat, that/should be done by her elder brother, or by anute.

All the sisters above named join in paying the taxes. They give the money to Canyte. The land is inherited from their father. She does not know whether her father bought the land otr inherited it from one of his parents or any other relatives. For that information I should go to see Hubert.

Mother's Deathand burial

Miss Emelia died about 6 months ago. She was 80 then. Previous to her death she used to share has house with her daughters and Canute. On her death she was huried by all(the) her children on the premises on which they live.

Asked if Miss Emelia had told her anything about old times Maud said - "She had to toil too hard to keep wi after wi father die; she never have anyk time to talk to wax wi about such things."

Interview With Canute Elliott

I had wet Canute previously/while he was his tomato garden. I arrived at his house at about, 6.45 am. Canute was then up and fully dressed. He wre a cap drawn fully down to cover the whole of the hair on his head. One of his sisters was in the kitchen preparing his tea. There were one or two boxes of ripe tomatoes standing in the yard. He kept looking towards the kike kitchen; he said he wanted to go off to the tomato xxx shed.

Asked his age Canute said -"A don't think a full up twenty (20). He appears at least 35. 't would not be surprising to hear he is 40.

He is building a 2 apartment cottage above that k he now shares with his sisters. He does not have a "Sweetheart," because he has not yet made any prantition "provision " for one. He means by Sweetheart, a woman sharing house and living with him, and whom he expects "to make a wife." He means by "provision" that he must have a house of his own to put his Sweetheart.

He does not now have a sweethearb because he has not finished making his house. He does not know when the house will be finished. He is anxious to finish it, but does not have the money to do so. He does not expect to be able to finish it after the present tomato crop because he is not going to get much money from the crop on account of the drought, which has consider ably affected the crop.

While he prepares the house for taking in a woman Canute has been running" his "mouth" with Wwomen the chief among which is Rebecca Spencer of Thatch Walk. Rebecca is the woman he will bring into the house when it is findished. She will be his sweetheart then, Rebecca is the daughter of Hardy Spencer also of kknt Thatch Walk.

Canute has 2 children by Beatrice Brooks.

children are: Canute/ Hubert/Elliott about 15, Oscar Hubert Elliott about 12.

> Canute is not going to take in Beatrice to share house and living with himm kx "because she has a fault -the fault ? - "She wont keep to one person," He means by that, that she will not confine her relationship to BREENERS SANKERS to the man with whom she sares house and living. He does not fing this fault with Rebecca.

CAREER

School: Canute did not got to school. He can neither read nor write.

Work: He began working at planting -cassava chiefly, as soon as he could manage himself, that is is before he was in his teens. He planted on his parents land now owned by his brother and his xxxxx sisters and himself.

He has worked for money for folks who used to live in Thatch Walk and Oli Green Olive. He worked for plenty people in Thatch Walk, but they are all now dead. Asked for some names he hesitated before Naming David Brooks (dead) and Harvey Spencer father of his sweetheart to be Rebecca Spencer. Those are the names of Thatch Walk people. In KREEN Green Olive he worked for Willie Rochester. Willie Rochester is still alive.

Work he said used to be "done for nothing, " i.e. at "/- px a day." He never worked for a whole week on stretch; he worked for just a day or 2 per week.

He has not done any work for anyone wax for a a kung/time." He does not know how long that is. He kaskakkakkak has worked after the last war. Waxako

Interviewed Amy. Elliott.

Amy lives in the same house with Adina, Vernice, Maud, Doris, Martin & Rebecca, xxixam - her sisters and Avilan, her son.

Land

Amy said she was not able to tell me anything about the land "since me have sense it don' survey out. Me is a young recrute you know me don' know. You will have to aske the harder one them.

Asked if she a paid rent. "Well me have to say yes for me help with thetaxes. It just come in like rent."

Amy does not know how much tax is paid on the land. All the sisters help to pay it. Amy generally gives her brother 1/- a year.

Occupation.

Amy does weeding sometimes. She workd for Septie Holness and Clarence Perkins. She does not weed for the whole week. She may work for 3 or 4 days at 1/2 a day. Amy also does plaiting. She buys the thatch in the market at New Market @ from 7d - 9d a dozen. She sells 16 yds, of plaited straw for 6d. One dozen "thatch" generally gives "2 to 3½ hats" 16 yds is s considered 1 hat. Amy does not make the hats she sells the plaited straw to higglers.

When I arrived she was scraping cassava. She said she was going to make bammies. Amy was not able to say how many bammies w she would get from her supply of cassava. "When the cassava don' take water it have more yielding flour." She planted the cassava in her little "ground up there." Amy showed me whee she had dug the cassava.

Interview with William Roach.

William Raach ix thanks he is about 40. He looks that. He was born in thatch Walk Bull Savannah. He is sharing house with house and housekeeping with Amy Elliott..

He does only cultivating now but used to do "fishening" once. - about 3 years ago. Asked why he had left off"fishening " he said - because a doan have enough he 1th to fishening and cultivate t at the same time."

Family History

Wm moth/er Rosie Brooks died when he was a baby. His father Sam Rosch, an ex-policemen, now lives in Port enderson. Rosie wed to live on her father a premises, same on which 4 uncles -Nick, Jacob, hillip and Stanford Brooks, and sunts Fanny and Dahl Brooks now live. Above named are her maken mothers brothers and sisters.

Rosie and Sam had 2 children.

1. -informant.

2. David Recach who now lives in Kingston. Wm. xxx writes to and goes to see him sometimes.

Rosie never shared house with his father. After her death Wm was raised by an uncle-a fathers brothe named bouis Roach. Uncle Louis still lived in thate walk. Uncle Louis neighbours are Maria Burke, and Florrie Hanson.-Florrie died last Sept.-

Wm Shared MXXX a one roomed house with uncle outs and uncle Louis son XX Albert each and daugter Esmine Reach. Uncle Louis treated him well gave him "everything: by everything he means mo new food and clothing.

Career

Wm cannot read or write because he never went of to school. He did not go to school because said he man never have anyone to send mi." His uncle ouis was willing to send him to school but could not menage it -could not keep kim up with books etc.

Begins to Work

Wm began wotking when he was a small boy. He does not remember what age that was. Work was weedin He did it chiefly for his uncles; they hired him at 6 per day. Usually he worked for from 2 to 3 days. The remember week. His uncles used to give him some cooked food whenever they had it.

work with Feti Elliott who now lives in Green Olive. Fiti paid him 1/- per day for digging holes to plant cassava holesor cutting carrying or weeking grass. Wm worked with Mr. Feti for many years.

Recently Wm has been working with teacher Millard for whom he has been drilling tomato holes cutting spreading and weeding grass at 3/- per day.

At"fishening "

Mr. Feti used to do "fishening" (fishing) in his (Mr. Fiti's) own boat, at Alligator Pond. Wm worked with Mr. Feti at fishig for about 18 years altogather In this period he lefth and returned to Mr. Fiti twice. ***Examples** He left finally about 3 years ago because Mr. Feti lost all the fishing tackle used with the bat and could nor afford to buy new ones. Perhaps it was not so much that Mr. Feti could not afford to buy new tackle but that he preferred to come home "to work in the earth."

Wm was one of four crew to Mr. Fetis boat. The crew was as follows:

k.Fiti Elliott -Captain; crew members uncles Louis

And Nick Brooks, and himself. They did not foshing some of the pots being made from wire others from bamboo. He kept and disposed of his catches as he saw fit. He sold catches to anyone who wanted fish kinkkinkin-small fish by the string, 6d and 1/-per string, depending on the length of the string. Big fish were sold by the 1b to people who came by truck from Kingston.

When any crew member caught no fish, of lost his fish pots the other fisherman would share their catches with him.

All the AXX members of the Canute Elliott household of which he is a part, share a common meal.cooked in a common pot. Illustrating this he said that if they were eating flour then everybody would join and put up the money necessary function to buy it. If one or more of them did not have anymoney to contribute to the buying then that one or that number would still get a share of the meal. Amy and Vernice are the chief cooks. XXXXXX

Interview with DaCosta Heathe

DaČosta is husband(c.1) to Doris Elliott. Asked hisage he said "a really don't know, but a believe a gone over 50: thats my judgeration." He appears to be in the mid fifties.

Family History:

DaCosta was born in Thatch Walk in Fedrick Mxxxle Heathe his mother's father's premises. When grand father Fedrick died has land was inherited by Fedrick Heathe one of his sons named after him.

Fedrick Grand Pa's son now lives in Alligator Pond where he has bought xxx a place of his own. He left Sarah to share the xxxx room built, xx with xx-

another sister.

Thomas,

DaCosta's father/now lives in his own house on hand he bought in Thatch Walk. Thomas neighbours are Lodrick Rochester and Florrie Stephenson.

CAREER

DaCosta did not go to school. Asked why he said "Dem natural was poor." -His parents were. His father wax a fisherman used to visit his mother and supported him as well as he could, but could not get enough money to send him to school.

Said DaCosta 2a MEE/to work before mi time. a use to get bit a day."(41d per day) He thinks he was between 12 and 15 years old when he began to work. The work -weeding. The wedding used to be done for he said, "everybody who need mi help." The chief of those people whem he worked for were -Charles Elliott MEEXARE Samuel Johnson, and David Roye of Bottom Bull Savannah: they are now dead; he worked also for Benjamin Heathe of Top Bull Savannah.

He used to work only for from 2 to theee days perf

At Fishing.

When he was about 18 DaCoata began to do fishing at Alligator ond. He was one of a crew of 4.in S muel'Johnson's boat. Samuel was the Captain. The other mankers aftather fishermen in the boat were Charles Rowe who is still engaged in fishing and Ellis Powell now dead.

DaCosta did not have a fish-pot of his own because he could not afford one, but the Captain had 8 pots while the other men had 4 each. The Captain and the other 2 menshared their catches with him; he got some of the fish to take home and some of the money the men got from the sale of the remainder of their catches. There was no standing arrangement as to what should be his share of the fish or the money got from the sale of them, Extenses but he never had occasion to be dissatisfed. With Karangan take Examinary Arrangement as trary he was always satisfied and pleased with what was given to him.

DaCosta continued to fish under these conditions for a few years. He does not remember how long that was. He next began to fish on the half for aman named William Lee. now dead. William supplied him with four pots. He shared equally/the catches made with these pots.

He is still fishing from Alligator Pond,"on the half." He does not remember the names of the Captain of his boat. (Hubert Elliott F.R.65 who was then present said the man(s name is Powell.) The other fisher men on the bot afe Heyman Rowe and Intermediate Heyman lives in Thatch Walk -is a neighbour to Wilfred Holness. Jacob lives in Plowden, Manchester.

Heyman and Jacob alse fish on the half.for the boat captain Powell. Powell owns the boat. DaCosta had to think a little before he remembers the name of the boat to be "The Sea Hawk."

He goes usually, every day, but as not gone out now for a few days -since Monday last on account of the high winds that are now being experienced.

He caught last Monday a few fish which he sold for 4/- cash. He always sells for cash, by the 1b. and to anybody who want to buy. He hasho special fix fish vendor who takes and disposes of his catches for him.

Jacob Brown/

He prefers to fish than to cultivate, because his health is not equal to the strain demanded by planting He does not go out to sea now chiefly because it demands a great deal of energy to man a beat in times when the wind and weather is as it is now.

He does not remember for how long he has been and sharing house with Doris; he knows however that he be gan to share the Canute Elliots House before the last war when he became attached to Doris. He has no children with Doris.

DaCosta was sitting in the yard picking, shelling gungu (congo) peas. Also engaged at the same task were sisters Amy, Adina, Rebecca, Vernice and Maud Elliott. Each had a contained for putting the peas in. They were going to use some of the peas for the evening meal. All the dinner would be cooked in one pot; everybody would get some of the dinner. They always cook like that: nobody cooks his own private pot: they always share their meals toghether.

James Powell

There was a visitor to the family/-a man from wellingtonn district , Manchester. He enquired my business, -was told, he said:

"Only Jesus can make things better. A God nomo (alone) fi reign. Not a love in a mankind. Dem hate were oneanother."

"Jesus love is boundless and free. Aman mus' love him Jesus to be able to love him fellow men.

The man then told the story fo a teacher who preached a very convincing sermon in Wellington. The teacher related in his sermon how he had found a man ingreat need and xill, and had gone in to the man's shabby place to help him. He had been ridiculed for doing that: ridiculee/lake that is unchristian the teacher had stressed.

Said James further: "Man's rule is a failure; if a man love od him wi love other people. Man heart is lost in sin. To find himself him mus' find Jesus the Light of the world. -Amen.

Interview with Adolphus Ellington

Adulphus Ellington a cultivator is 22. His mother is Adina Elliott, his father-Albert Ellington He is the only child his mother has for hisfather.

Adolphus was born in the Elliott household of which he is still a part. He has been told that his father used to ahare house with his mother at the time of his birnt and continued to till he was livers old. At that time Albert left his mother and took another woman -Martena Elliott, Adina's sister. He has been sharing house and liveing with Martena since.

Adolphus recalls with bitterness that Albert has never been supporting him. To support him his mother had to work hard at weeling grass, and -"once did a little speculating," i.e. she sold fish.

School: "Sh' school mi regular'; i.e. she (his mother) sent him to school regularly. School age was from 7 till he was 15. He left school in the 4th book. All he ever got from Albert while he was going to school was a 4d pencil -slate pencil.

Asked whether Albert did not support him because he was unable to or because he did not want to he said -"Well, not so much because him could not: him never give mi anything at all except a farthing pencil." kxxxxixxxxxxxx There was bitterness in his voice. "id he never give you any food? "Yes but nothing of consequence."

About 6 months after Adoldhus left school, he be gan to work at "cutting bush, planting potatoes and all those things." He did that for himself. He was about 15½ then.

Planting was done on share on Issaz Johnson's land and at the same time on Jane Perkins land. The Crops on these holdings were sometimes shared equally; sometimes Adolphus got two out of three shares. He got that when he gox took the raw lamd and cultivated it without any help from the owner. He got a half share when he got help from the owner to prepare the land or to was helped with a supply of seed plants, cuttings etz.

Johnson's land

The peice of Issac Johnson's land he used to m work is at Backass. He fleased working on it only a month age because -"a don't feel to work on it no more Why? -"My intention is not set on there anymore."
Why? -"because he (Issac) don't treat mi too well on it." What does he do? -He insists on having a hlaf of the crops grown, but does not provide enough help to justify the demand.

Jane's land

He is still working Jane's land at "Down-a'-Row; i.e. near to Nicholas Brooks land, "line an' line with Nicholas'." Jane treats him with "nice" helps him with money to work the land.

Crops

On Johnson's land he has been planting cassava Eximity - 3 acre. He did not say what is the area of the Jane Perkins' land on which he xixx grows cassava chiefly, but also EXEXAX gungo (congo) peas. He sells "a small portion" of the cassava crop only; never sells any of the gungo peas because he never has enough to sell. Last crop he reaped 1½ bushels of this peas. He gave away 2 quarts of that only, to his brother Victor Ellington. He could not affine afford to give away anymore. He brought the peas crop to his mother's. She uses it for the household.

The interview concluded because Adolphus had to go to attend some business: the business seems to -tomatoes, reaping and getting it to the toamto shed. I do not know whether the tomato is his own, or as yet whether her plants any. He was possible helping Canute who has a field above the house and kixex kitche n, andwas observed sedecting and picking fruit for the factory. There were a number of tomato (Ja. Vegetable) boxes stacked up in a corner of the yard.

Family history.

Rosann Rowe died a few years ago. Her husband /c.l./ was Henry Elliott - he was brother of Thomas Ritiotty late Thomas Elliott, c.l. husband of Alice Heath in Thatch Walk.

Children of Rosann Rowe and Thomas Elliott. Their spouses.

Hubert Elliott - see Fam. Rec. 65. Haxinxyaungarxthanxhubertx

Canute Elliott. Kenger Canute Elliot "first was with Beatrix Powell"/vel Brooks/ who was c.l.wife of his elder brother Hubert. For the particulars see Hubert Elliott's family record 65. He had "one child with Bea - it was around 15 - 16 years ago. Elliott Oscar his name. As Canute "never have xxkx a house" of his own, Bea Powell never shared house with him. "The child move up and down from father to mother" who went to live in her parents home after she was sent away by Hubert. Now Oscar is living with Canute.

His next girl friend was McDonald Cornelius daughter from Little Pedro. Tax She had no h ildren with him. "Him leave that woman now and now him is along with Rebecca Spencer"/Thatch Walk/. He visits Rebecca at her home but noes not live at her place. Neither Rebecca at his family home. But Canute is building now his own house. It is possible that Rebecca will join him in his house as the house and land she is living now on is for her son Ivan Powell.

Maud Elliott: "have no children at all; living all the time in the old home; one eye blind. Dont have no man."

Adina Elliott. Living in the "old home" with her c.l.husband Dacosta Heath and her son Adolphous Ellington.

"Adina was first along with Albert Ellington - have one boy for him: Bradley Ellington where - go by name of Adolphous Adolphous living in the same old home with mother. Her riason liaison with Albert Ellington did not last for a long time as she was succeeded by her sister Martena who is now living together with Albert Ellington for many years. /see FamRec.65/.

Martena Elliott. Now c.l. wife of Albert Ellington. "She is along with Albert Ellington. First she was along with Henrietta Brooks son - Albert Brooks. Have one child for Albert Brooks. The child is with the mother, living in Albert Ellington home. Clarice Brooks her name."

Adina Elliott - continued. After Adina Elliott was deserted by Albert Ellington for her sister Martena, she "was along with Dacosta Heath, son of Thomas Heath and Sarah Heath - same sister of Caroline Hetth living in Thatch Walk." Thomas and Sarah - "they never married". They have the same family name "Heath" but xxxxxxx probably are no relatives. "Dacosta was with Sarah Heath all his life. Now living with in Canute's home along with Adina. "They have no children.

Amy Elliott. Living in the old home with her c.l.husband William Roach.and their son Harviland Roach. "Elliott Amy is now along with William Roach / nephew of Leuis Roach and brother of Dalwell Roach." William Roach "living there - in theold home with Amy Elliott. Have one boy: Haviland Roach - around 18 years. They boy is with them."

Vernice Elliott. She belongs also to the housemates of the "old home." One of the sisters is nicknamed "Sister and Dudax ley thinks it is Vernice. Vernice is now with Hidalgo Rhoden who visits her at ax her place. She dose not join him in his house probably because "Hidalgo Rhoden- no strong support

Her first child Daphe Perkins was for Ed old Edawrd Perkins. "Daphne Perkins - the girl by Vernice for old Edward Perkins - the girl living in the old home" /with the mother/. "Daphne have not any children - she is a girl with a split lip." Vernice's liaison with Edward Perkins was a casual one: "she was not long time with him - is only a run through. Edward Perkins was a married man."

Then "she was with Lufton Roy - before he was with Iris Brooks. Lufton Roy had a child by the same girl - supposedly

"After Lufton Roy leave and go to Iris Brooks, she /Vernice/
go from Lufton Roy to Hidalgo Rhoden and she is with him. She
live in the old home." Her childrenxxin the Census: Eveline Rhoden /now about 12/and Dolcis Rhoden /now about 7/.

Doris Elliott. "She is along with Ernest Holness" with whom she shares his house as his c.l.wife. "Previously she was along with young Thomas Heath, son of old Thomas Heath: she had 3 children for him. The eldest boy - we call him Mike - about 13 years old - all the time living from father to him grand-father. Next daughter Lenora - she is in her grandmother home, down Rosann Rowe - the mother living with Ernest Holness.

Next boy - Hermann - in Thatch Walk' from him grandfather home /old Thomas Heath/ to him grandmother home /late Rosann Rowe/ and to stepfather home /Ernest Holness with whom his mother lives now/. He is a little rogue, a thief. No good name at all. Moving from one to another."

"The balance of children" /that Doris has are for Ernest Holness. Veron, Raphael and others -"about 5 children together."

Dudley's information is superficial as he does not visit this family. His impressions: "All they live in the old home, but they have separate house / = rooms/ in the old home: like in the balmyard. A lots of sisters and all them sisters have different men. So them have to have them separate room - 3 or 4 rooms, separate beds, lots of people. There are two other buildings besides the kirche." Dudley does not know whether they cook and farmixing eat together. He thinks "they don't cook together - xamaxxix though some of them cook together. Everybody have a separate man to plant for them woman and you have to cook for him - him have to visit you."

Ed. F. Interview with Rebecca Elliott

Rebecca greeted me warmly. She had not seen me for such a long time she had thought I had gone to America. She is glad I have tome back to Bull Savannah. She likes the members of the survey staff here. Will I give her best wishes to the young ladies attached to the staff?

"A si y'u with a nice lady: that is y'u wife I know; sh' is a nice lady; a fancy her. A si y'u with other lady but a fancy that one most: sh' fat, an'so nice sh' mus' be y'u wife; everybody fancy the lady --everybody si the lady an' as mi si him mi think that should be your wife."

Told that I am married but that D.H. is not my wife, she said -"Oh! she is a lovely lady; a nice match for you. It would be jus' like in some of those missions y'u know, some a them black man marry them pretty woman."

She was found sitting under a banana tree sewing a pillow case -a new pillow case. Said she "mi like nice something to lie down pon; look at the right side of it." She showed the right side of the piece of floral cotton she was sewing.
