Changes from 1943.

This household - one in 1943 - split now into 3 separate households. Two brothers: Bradley Dyer and Gerald Dyer built their own houses to which they moved, whereas sister ~~had been xxxxxxxx left~~ remains in the old parental house.

Father Allan Dyer.

Their father was Allan Dyer. Allan Dyer "got the land from his father and him die and leave it ~~Gerald and Bradley~~ to Bradley /and Gerald/.  
Cf. also Fam.Rec. 114.

Bradley Dyer - his new house. His girl Daisy Powell.

"Dyer Bradley - moved to his new house quite recently - about last year. With his girl Daisy - she living with him now. One Daisy Powell, old George Powell ~~daughter~~ granny. Daisy Powell mother is Annie Powell, but her name is Sutherland - her father's name."

In the new house built by Bradley "both of them live and two baby - their children."

Previously, ~~working~~ "at Major Moxsy", Bradley "work at the factory." It was "before he went to America" in 1944. "Bradley is a tailor - he has his tailoring at Miss Edith Powell shop" - together with Ernest Powell.

Gerald Dyer.

His girl friend Rose Simpson, Izan Simpson's daughter.

"Gerald Dyer is also preparing his own home. He is "building his new house right over Esmine's hut. He is sleeping there now, but he has not taken his wife as yet." His cl. wife is "one girl, Izan Simpson daughter, Rose Simpson from Shaddock Hill. She living with the father. They have one baby."

Gerald Dyer went also to America in 1945. He is a cultivator, does not work and did not work at the factory. His house was built possibly from the American money.

Sisters in the old home: Zemina and Zelavine Dyer.

The old home is inhabited by ~~the six~~ two sisters of Bradley and Gerald: Zemina and Zelavine, and their children.

Zemina Dyer and John Roy. Their children.

Zemina Dyer had two children for John Roy. Both children, boys, are living with her. Their names: Burnett Roy and Garthie Roy. Garthie Roy is still a small boy. Burnett is "a cultivator, works with his mother and works at the cannery."

Zemina Dyer is faithful to John Roy, though ~~the man~~ he is now ~~with other~~ ~~women~~ along with other girls. She "expects to be married, isn't along with any other man. Still waiting for John Roy."

Next sister, Zelavine Dyer, has 3 children - all by Ernest Powell, the tailor. /see Census Sch.1/

Ernest Powell is now married to another woman and Zelavine is no more "along with him".

Now "she is along with Dan Williams", but little is known to Dudley S. and Bradley R. of their relationship.

Family life of this household.

The land which they inherited from their father is not subdivided. They share it in common.

"Them keep the land as the father leave it. No quarrells. Bradley and Gerald them work together and Zemina and Zelavine, what they can afford to do they still work together. Two sister together. and two brother together. The father/s/ of the children support the children. And Zelavine is the supervisor an the packing house. Zemina - she work in the packing house too, wrapping tomato."

The household at present consists of:

1. Zemina Dyer (informant) "about 36."
2. Zillahvine Dyer, about 32, sister to Zemina.
3. Gerald Dyer, brother.
4. Bernet Roye, 19, son to Zemina and Arthur Roye.
5. Gorty Roye, 11, son to Zemina and Arthur Roye.
6. Roncliffe Powell, ~~xxx~~ 9; son to Eva Dyer, a sister now dead, and James Powell James is the husband of Rose Powell.
7. Lampert Powell, 7, son to Zillahvine (she is called Zillah) and Earnest Powell
8. Beverly Powell, about 5 or 6, daughter to Zillah and Earnest Powell.
9. Roy Powell, son, 3, also child to Zillah and Earnest Powell.

All of the above named share meals, ~~with~~ cooked either by Zillah or by Zemina. With the exception of Gerald Dyer, ~~xxxxxx~~ all those named sleep in the house a 2 apartment cottage. Gerald ~~lives~~/in his own house he has built on a portion of the family land.

/sleeps

Zillah is cooking dinner today. Yesterday she cooked dinner also, while Zemina cooked lunch. The cost of all meals are shared by Zemina, Zillah and by Gerald. This is always done.

Family History

Her mother Mrs. Lydian Dyer, died when she was 13. Her father ~~Dyer~~ Allan Dyer, died 11 years ago.

Lydian and Allan had 9 children; in order of age the are:

1. Naomi Dyer Campbell (Mrs.) she is in New York. She is about 44.
2. Edmund Dyer, about 40; he is dead.
3. Zemina Dyer, (herself) 36.
4. Eva Dyer, 36, dead.
5. Dudley Dyer, 34; he is in Kingston.
6. Zillahvine Dyer, her sister sharing house with her, and also interviewed.
7. Bradley Dyer, 28. Lives in Ridge.-B.S.
8. Gerald Dyer, 26, He lives in own house built on Family land.
9. Lucille Dyer; she is 24; she lives in Kingston

Her mother's mother ~~xxx~~ Dorothy Lewis is a ~~xxxxxx~~ member of ~~xxxxxxx~~ Charles Lewis' household; T.B.S. Charles is her son. Her mother's father was Charles Lewis now dead. Charles Lewis of Top Bull Savannah is the only child alive to Charles Lewis (snr.) his father, and Dorothy Lewis his mother.

Grand ma Dorothy had no children by ~~another~~ union. other than with her ~~father~~ husband.

Mr. Charles her husband had by/other unions:

1. Mrs. Maud Ann Johnson of Bottom Bull Savannah.
2. Mrs. Sarah Holness of Commer Penn.
3. Mrs. Sargeant Lewis; she is dead.

The land

The land -11 acres, on which the house is built, is owned by all the children. This land was left by her father. he did not make a will. Taxes for the land is paid by Gerald and Bradley in Dudley's name.

Her childhood:

Zemina grew up with her mother and father, brother and sisters in the house she now occupies with her sister Zillah.

Childhood duties: She was taught at an early age to help wash, clean house, tidy kitchen, sweep yard, and tidy; she thinks she was about 10 when special effort was made to see that she was learning to do these things.

School: She attended the Bull Savannah elementary school from she was 7 till she was 12 or 13, and in the 5th book.

Childhood Ambitions: "A wanted to learn to make my own clothes and to do fancy work." (Fancy-work= embroidery etc.) She did not get the opportunity to learn to do any of these things. Her mother died when she was 12 or 13. Her mother's death hindered the putting into effect of any such plans.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~

CAREER.After school -Work:

"My mother die when a was 12, an' a go out to work when a was 15." Work was housework in Christiana, at 8/- per month.

Contact for job: -"A lady got the job for me. She use to live here an' trade market in Christiana." Mrs. Feutado the woman with whom Zemina went to work had asked this woman market trader to "get somebody to work for her."

She did not like the work. It was hard work. She stayed a year at it.

Goes to work in Kingston: She returned here where she remained with her father for for some time, before she went to Kingston to do housework. Eva then alive, and working in Kingston got her the job. The people with whom Eva worked had wanted another servant and had asked Eva to get one for them. Eva had sent for her then. She was paid 4/- per week initially; later she used to get 5/- per week regularly, and sometimes as much as 7/- per week when she did extra work - washed ~~xxxxxxx~~ more clothes than for the immediate family.

She did not keep this job for very long; she left it and for others like it. She remained in Kingston for 2 years altogether. During this period she would sometimes come home to spend a week or two.

She returned home:

She was 19 or 20 when she returned home to do "hard work - ground work," i.e. she worked at cultivations of tomatoes. That was in about 1936 or 1937. She has not left this district since.

Her cultivations:

She has been planting also, congo and red peas, corn and ~~xxxxxxx~~ other food crops since her return from Kingston. She is helped with these cultivations by her brothers Gerald and Bradley, as well as with by Arthur Roye, called John Roye. Arthur is her boy-friend. He does not share house with her but comes to see her regularly. ~~xxx~~

She sometimes employs labour - employs whosoever she can get. Her chief helper is Vernon Perkins of Ridge.

Tomatoes: She planted (Zillah joining) 1000 holes of tomatoes last tomato crop. Her crop was not as good as it could otherwise have been because she had planted too early, and her crop had got caught in the drought. She made £6 clear profit; that is, she made £6 after she had paid her crop expenses. Zillah also got £6. Beginning with last year, Zillah ~~xxxx~~ has been sharing half the expenses and labour on the crops she has been planting. They share the crops or monies from the crops.

John's courtship

She had her first child Bernet Roye, when she was 16 or 17; that was after she had returned from Christian

Interview with Zemina DyerMeeting Arthur -John: his advances:

John was a friend of her family. He used to visit the family. He met her at home. Later he wrote to her, told her in the letter that he loved her, and would like to marry her if she would consent to become his "sweetheart."

Asked what she did on receiving the letter she said -"Mi noh answer it." She did that about a week after she had received ~~received~~ his. She agreed to become his sweetheart. The frequency of his visits increased.

Her first pregnancy:

About a year after she had become John's friend, she found she was going to have a baby: -Bernet.

Own reactions to pregnancy:

She had not been quite sure she was pregnant till the pregnancy was about 3 months old. She discovered this herself. She had used to feel badly -"throw up, couldn't drink water nor nothin' couldn't keep a thing down, A didn't feel good in mi mind either because a wasn't looking for that." She did not tell anyone about her pregnancy, save John. She didn't want to tell anybody because she was ashamed; she allowed everybody, her father included, to find out for themselves.

John's reaction:

"Him noh tell mi sey mi mustn' fret." He promised, that he would soon see about marrying also. He did not say when he intended getting married. His promise to marry her made her mind "easy." for a "little while."

Father's reaction:

"Him quarrel; him never like it. Him sey John have to find place put mi, but John come talk to him an' mi still remain in the home. Him (her father) never sey mi mus' move again."

She does not know what John said to her father. She was not at home when John called to she her father. Her absence from home was accidental, not planned. Her father had not told her about John's visit. John told her about the visit after he had made it, and that "everything would be alright."

Baby's arrival-and John's attention:

She was attended by Miss Cella Simpson -Auntie Cella Simpson. When she "took in to have the baby," her

father went to call Auntie ~~Cella~~ John, who went to call Auntie Cella.

Auntie Cella's treatment:

"Shi bathe mi first with hot water, an' then ninte (ninte= annoint) mi tummy with castor oil. Shi give mi bush tea (of sweet sop of varry vine) an' shi give mi some milk before the baby wa s born. ~~g~~ -"After the baby was born mi never drink nothin'.

She did not have a difficult time. Baby's arrival was unaided. John remaind on the premises while the baby was arriving. He came to see her and the baby before the ninth day.

Her reaction to John's other courtships:

She knows John has a number of other courtships. She is jealous about that. "Write that!" she ~~xxx~~ she said laughing a little, -"write that I am jealous!" She has had quarrels with these other girl friends. Asked how many other girl friends she thought there were -thinks there are, she said laughing the while -"100 of them." She said after -"he has 3 other girl friends, -altogether has 4 girl friends. Asked who are these, she named:

1. "Coolie Spence or Sinclair," of Commer Pen.
2. Linette Lewis of Tadd Town. She had some difficulty remembering Linettes names; she was only able to remamber the "pet name;" She asked Zillah who sat a few yards away fot the name. She did that quietly, perhaps, because John who had arrived during the course of the interview was then in the house nearby. Zillah gave her the correct names ~~of~~ -Linette Lewis.
3. Mavis Rochester; Zemina hesitated before naming Mavis. She had to ask of Zillah -"wha' Duncie name again?" Zillah said-"Mavi Rochester. Zemina had not seemed to want to name Mavis. The reason was not apparant; Mavis lives on premises a-joining John's; (Perhaps she hesitated because she thought it would be thought Mavis had priority of claim ~~xxxxxxx~~ to John by reason of her proximity. There was no evidence this assumption is correct.)

She has had quarrels with Mavis, and with Linette, but "mi an' the other one in Commer Pen never quarrel. Wi

never fight; wi only quarrel; wi pass an' make confusion -molest one another. Wi pass oneanother an' drop wud (wud=words) for one another, but wi never fight.

These quarrels have decreased in frequency as the years have gone by, but they have never quite ceased; they have become few and far between.

John's support of his children:

"Him give mi what him have; mi can't complain.

Religion

"Mi don't join none."

Re Jehovah Witnesses: Mi noh believe ina that one at all -noh believe inx that one; mi noh believe that is the right way. Them sey God come from 1914, an' that all them pretty house that Mr. Hastings an' all them makin', that nothin' goin' happen to them. We goin' come live back in them afterwards. Lion goin' tame like a puss an' all them things.

Re Sweetheart Life: Fi them religion sey y'u can do anything. Y'u can even live Sweetheart life -that that noh nothin'. So fi them religion sey." She said that in a rather critical and sacastic tone.

Re Seventh Day Adventism: -"Mi noh even hear what them have fi sey. Mi never go wey them preachin' at all.

Re Bible Church of God: -"A that one mi believe in. Mi believe that one is the right way. Milike ~~mi like~~ all that them sey preach sey, because mi believe all a wey them sey is the true.

Anglican Church: -"A long time mi never go there, x so mi caan tell y'u nothin' about that; them good to', but mi believe ina Ribbit more. (Ribbit -the Bible Church of God in Ribbit Town.)

Her present attitude towards John

Mi noh feel good about his havin' other girls, but after mi can't help it -after him wont hear what mi sey.

A total of at least 4 other men have made advances to her but she has rejected them. She was reluctant to

name these suitors for reasons not obvious.) Each of these suitors had written to her. -asked her in the letters to be friends with them: -"Mi tell them no." She gave verbal replies -never wrote any letters in reply.

Asked why she had said "no" she said: -"Because somebody dey before them, an' mi caan bother with 2 or 3, mi rather the one."

She does not know -"can't tell," whether John will marry one of his present girl-friends: -"That dey hard to tell."

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John dressed in a cap, a cotton shirt, and khaki, all newly laundered, had come during the course of the interview. He was freshly shaved and wore a pleasant smile. (He is almost always smiling pleasantly) I was sitting with Zemina' -facing her, at one stage ~~sitting~~ but beside her when he arrive. The interview was given under a mango tree in the yard. He stayed with us for about a minute, and then sauntered off towards another mango tree where he sat talking with Eli Perkins a member of the Jehovah's Witnesses group here. Eli was on one of the regular visits made here by members of his groups ~~in~~ in effort to propagate their ~~religious~~ beliefs. Zemina kept looking after John as he walked away, but when I suggested that she perhaps would like to see him and that she should not allow the interview to ~~hinder~~ hinder her, she said it was "alright."

John stayed talking with Eli under the mango tree about 50 yards away for a long time. He was using his hands while he talked. We could not see Eli, as he was screened from view by the mango tree, ~~under~~ ~~which~~ ~~he~~ ~~sat~~ ~~with~~ ~~John~~. Every now and then, Zemina would look in his ~~direction~~ direction, but she showed no anxiety to go to him. She said laughingly, that Eli and John had been great friends before Eli had become a christian, and that Eli was now trying to convert him.

Zemina laughed a great deal during the interview, remarking sometimes that I was fortunate that it was she whom I was interviewing and not her sister Zillah; she was sure Zillah would not tell me anything. I am lucky; ~~as~~ D.B. had come to see her some weeks ago, but she had not told D.B. anything, she was not then feeling well, and was somewhat annoyed about previous questions asked her about her private business. She has told me everything however - ~~really~~ - ~~I~~ - ~~am~~ - ~~lucky~~; she chased D.B.

/bedroom; John also. Neither came out. John throughout the interview. As the talk concluded, she asked me to come to ~~sevent~~ into the house ~~while~~ John was ~~abed~~. I interviewed him on Wednesday next. Zillah after. Zemina said a cheerful goodbye from the//

Interview with Zillahvine Dyer:Her Childhood

She lived with her parents brothers and sisters during her childhood.

School: She attended the Bull Savannah School from she was 7 till she was 15. She left school in 4th book. She was a "dunce."

~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ CAREER

After school, she did "a little sewing" with Mrs. Violet Lewis wife of her mother's brother Charles Lewis. She was not charged any money by Miss Vie for her sewing tuition. She really was adopted by Miss Vie, and was ~~xxxxxxx~~ the household. She remained a part of this household till she was 19. She has learnt to sew her own dresses but does not take in any ~~xxxx~~ jobs. She sews for her children also.

Miss Vie still regards her as her daughter. She goes to see her (see Miss Vie) often.

Reasons for leaving Miss Vie's

She left Miss Vie's, because -"Mi an' uncle Charles x son (David Lewis, now dead) couldn't get along. Everything him make a quarrel. She does not know why he used to quarrel with her.

Meeting Earnest Powell:- her children:

It was after she had met Miss Vie's that she met x Earnest. He wrote to her -asked her in his letter "to be ~~his~~ friend with him." She replied about 2 weeks after, giving her consent. That was about a year x after she had left Miss Vie's.

In his letter to her he had told her he loved her, "and him promise mi marriage." They became closer friends, and later she became pregnant.

Re her own reactions to Pregnancy:

She would not say what were her own reactions to her pregnancy. She said -"Massa, mi naw tell y'u that; you must know by this: others mus' tell y'u!"

She had used to attend services at the Anglican Church then. Mr. Blight, who was then headmaster of the elementary school here, used to preach at the church as does the present school headmaster Mr. Millard. Neither members of the church nor Mr. Blight censured her nor in any way made any comment to her in regards her pregnancy. She feels they could not censure her because she ~~xxxxxxx~~ was not confirmed. She never went to church/after she discovered ~~she~~ she was pregnant.

She has been attending Missionary meetings and concerts held by the church however..

Her Sisters reaction to/Pregnancy:

"Zemima quarrel an' sey mi shouldn't have any now." Zemima quarreled only during the first ~~3~~ months of the pregnancy. Zemina had not discovered that she was prggant till after the pregnancy was about one month old.

Earnest's Reaction:

She told Earnest about her pregnancy about a month after she was supposed to have conceived. He told her -"all kinds of nonsense," told her all kinds a poppy show ." ("poppy-show= puppet show ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~ foolishness) She remembered little or nothing of what he said, because that happened such a long time ago.

His marroage : Her reactions to his marriage:

He married Jo yce Holness about 4 years ago. She was then displeased about his marrying another girl, but she does not now mind. She is now really glad she did not marry him, because he ~~ix~~ "drinks too much." He always used to ~~ix~~ drink, but is doing that more heavily now.

Support of his Children:

His support of his children is poor -almost non-~~xxxxxx~~ existent. He is unable to do better she believes because of the uncertain returns ~~xfrom~~ from his tailoring.

Her employment at the factory:

Asked about her work at the tomato factory, she laughed pleasantly and said with what seemed a little show of pride: -"From the first plant they plant the tomato I was working there. he firs' 2 yeass a pack, an' after that a supervise the work with the girls them. She is still a supervisor at the factory -that is she worked last crop and expe cts to work during the coming crop as a supervisor. When she worked for a full week she used to get 45/- for the week. She got pay otherwise for the number of days she worked~~ix~~ -when packing is being done. Last crop started on January 15 or 16, and ended sometime in April. She worked during all the packing days during the crop.

Savings and investments:

From her earnings she saved "about £17: -maybe a little more." From these savings she has bought one sheep

for 30/-, and one pig for 18/-. "He is keeping the remaining portion of her savings ~~xxxx~~ -"to serve mi through the year," she added.

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Gorty brought out a roasted mango from the kitchen. It was obviously hot because the boy had to rest it on the grass quickly. He proceeded to remove the charred skin from the fruit there.

Asked if it is customary to roast mangoes here, and whether she prefers it roasted, Zillah said that she prefers eating mangoes as ripe unroasted fruit because they taste better ~~thatixxx~~ like that. She believes the children have taken up the habit of roasting after ~~watixixix~~ observing pregnant women doing it. Pregnant women sometimes roast mangoes, because they develop strange tastes and fancies.

Zillah was wearing a pair of shoes in good condition. her sister Zemina previously interviewed, was wearing a ~~pair~~ of old shoes the counters of which had been removed to make it into a pair of slippers. Zillah was wearing a clean cotton dress of floral material. She appears modest and generally quietdispositioned.
