Old Mrs. Sarah Simspon was sitting on a low bench under the mango tree in company of her daughter-in law Lydia Ford. They were shelling french beans. On another bench a young woman was pleating. She was Mavis Jacobs. A lot of small children were running about.

The housing. The old two-room house belongs to Sarah Simpson. It was built by her late husband Richard Simpson. The kitchen in a separate all thatch building is rathe quaint. It has a sort of verandah made of sticks. In the house lives Sarah Simpson with two grannies (children of her youngest son "Crafton and Lydia Ford) and lodgers: Reggie Swaby with his C.L. wife Mavis Jacobs and their children Etheline and Dony.

Crafton Simpson with his wife and 4 children lives in a newer house nearby to which a small "outhouse" is attached - it serves as a buttery. The three women use one kitchen.

Between the kitchen and the old house there is a big "donkey house" the only one I have seen in Bull. Sav. It has a thatched roof and "walls" made of thick sticks. Behind the old house there is a very small thatch structure. This is the "pig house" also the only one in B. Sav. (as far as I know)

## Sarah Simpson

She is a very old woman and a little deaf. Some of my questions were shouted to her by the daughter in law. She was very willing however to talk. We reckoned her age in the following way: she said she was 24 when she married. "I marry when I was 24. For two years after I marry I didn't have any pickeny. The first one was James." Lydia said sames was 57 now, so we calculated it - everybody the two young women, the two young men and myself making the sums. When Sarah heard she must be 83 she said she must be much more, but she didn't know really accurately.

Barah said her mother's name was Elizabeth Elliott "Father Aaron "ochester and mother Elizabeth Elliott from Ballards Valley, family to Charlie Elliott . Charlie Elliot him die last year. He was shaky before he die." (Charles Elliot was the father of Moses Elliott F.R. 21) However xx when I checked later the name of Sarah's mother in F.R. of Sarah's sisters and brothers it was Ann from "ochester family born in Green Olive. This has to be investigated again. Either Sarah gave me the name of her grandmother, or she was the child of AaronRochester in some other union. Sarah however said that her full brothers and sisters were "Mehalda marry Thompson, Charlie Thompson and Peggy marry Freddy Thompson. Two sisters marry two brothers live here in Bottom. Judith Moses Elliott wife and Ellen Dyer. James Rochester and Aaron Rochester. And others them die. I am the oldest of the daughters, the living ones." (She omitted Jane Powell who is alive).

When Sarah was a young girl in her mother's home there was a church already in Bull-Savannah "I was a member" she said proudly. However Sarah didn't go to the Sabbath school nor to the daily school. "My mother too poor to send me. Father die and leave her with plenty pickeny. She had it hard, had to work hard and I help her." Sarah remembered however th names of the teachers: "There was teacher Blake and teacher Mense, and the old teachers them die. Then it was teacher Blythe and now instituted teacher another teacher" (She didn't remember the name of the present teacher Millard.) Sarah didn't learn to read. "er mother taught her the little prayer "Pray mamma etc" (See Village Life No ) which Sarah in turn is teaching now her grandchildren who stay with her.

Her husband Richard Simpson. When she was 24 she married Richard Simpson. He was the son of Robert Simpson and Ellen from Holness family. Robert Simpson lived in the house

in Shaddock Hill with his wife katking where Lena Holness lives now. Richard got from his father "This land in Bottom and built the house here." "Richard' brothers, Tomay impson, Alec Simspn and Robert Simpson. Them all dead now". Sarah knew also her husband's paternal grand-father Thomas Simpson. "Thomas Simpson Trip - a little nickname." Thomas Simpson was also the father of Daniel the father of Izan. "Izan he is to call me aunt. Him marry my daughter Martha." Sarah also spoke of "Aunty Sue" After a long genealogical disscussion we placed aunty Sue as one of old Thomas Trip xisters. She was also the mother of Robert Simpson who lives now in Shaddock Hill (F.R.39) Unfortunately I couldn't find out what was the reason why Sarah wanted to speak about aunty Sue. Perhaps talking of the older generation she focussed her memory on those people who belonged to it. Its with difficulty that Sarah passed from subject to subject, and although I tried not to rush the conversation she would sometimes answer a ques tion after we passed already and were talking for a good while about something else. The younger people however wouldn't interrupt her, but only occasionally helped. There was definitely an attitude of respect towards Sarah shown by the younger people but not by the small children.

Her widowhood. "My husband die and live me alone with the pickentes. Died long ago. The youngest Crafton him never knew his father. Just two months." Sarah was left alone with her children . compared with her married life the time of widowhood was very hard. "I had it hard, I work hard, x in the field." Her other sons were already "big men". They worked in the fields but Sarah used to help them. "When them wood I wood with them and planting yams I work with the hoe and they come and help me in the home." I asked arah whether her brothers and sisters couldn't help her a little. But Sarah said they had their own families to look after. The didn't want "To burden them". Sarah thinks that at present it is much easier to get help and assistance two from people. Not that they are better now, but "More people now more to come and help you with every little." When Sarah came to live in this place there was only one house in the immediate neighbourhood that of Mr. Dyer. And now ther are in the same radius six houses. - She enumerated them to me. - The nearest shop was in Ballards Valley and the markets in Malvern and Mandeville. They hardly ate bread, not so often as nowadays. Bammies were the staple food. Nobody went to the hospital "If you sick - just stay at home and call doctor if you can." The nearest doctors were in Mandeville and in Black River, they didn't come on visits to Bull Savannah tikexxx unless brought to a special case. Since all her children grew up Sarah feels easier. She wit still works. The works in her garden, takes part in the cooking and pleats strips for hats.

The craft of pleating. After the french beans were shelled led Sarah and the two young women set to pleat long tresses of silver thatch, some mixed with coconut leaves strips.

#daughters

Sarah was working swiftly pleating 11 "threads". She was taught to do it not by her mother but by her husband. She said in her childhood this was not known in Bull Savannah. The parents of her husband used first to do it and sell. Now Mrs. Byer from hocolate Hole buys by yards. The one Sarah is doing will be paid 6d for 16 yards. Mavis was doing a simpler one which will be paid 9 d. for 40 yards. It takes Mavis 3 days to make 40 yards, of course she has some other occupations, but says she spends all the time free from home & children duties pleating.

Sarah's children "Izabelle in St. Mary. She married Plummer; Hilda Dyer don't have any pickeny; Martha married to Izan. Crafton the youngest stay with me; James and "ilbert them live here." I knew about the dispute about law land between her two sons "ilbert and Crafton. constable Holness from Chocolate Hole told me about it. "ilbert is a drunkard and a described here as unbalanced. He threatened to kill his brother and pushed the constable who came to settle the dispute. As Sarah said one of her grannies was a "bad boy" I asked her which one of her sons was a bad boy. But she said there were no bad boys among her children. She obviously didn't want to tell about the family dispute. (James the eldest is 57, Crafton the youngest 32. For others is resp. F.R.)

Except Hilda yer all Sarah's children have children. The youngest son Crafton lives in common household but separate house. However two of his children The 6 yrs old Thelma and 5 yrs old Wilfred sleep with the granmother Both Lydia and Sarah said Wilfred was a bad boy. Introduced so the little boy demonstrated at once his badness". His sister Thelma was eating a sweet I gave her and he snatched it from helma and gave her a kick. Reprimanded by the grandmother he went to the house took a machette and was waving it dangerously near other small children. Sarah says she teaches them "manners" and also taught them the little prayer which they say every evening. Thalma shylingvaturabax shyly stammered the prayer with the assis tance of all present. When I gave sweets to the children Sarah insisted that every one says "Thank you Missis" and saw/that every child said it.

Her daughter in law and sharing household. I told Sarah that in all countries all over the world mother in law and daughters in law don't seem to get along very well especially if they live in one household. Sarah and Lydia laughed and waixxx Sarah said "We live good we never quar-

/to it

rel." The three women: Sarah Simpson, her daughter in law Lydia Ford and the lodger Mavis Jacobs all cook in the same kitchen. They say they cook even all the meals in one pot. I asked how it was possible and how they knew what part of the food each had a right to. "We look one pot" said Sarah. After the meal is cooked it is dished out by one of them - the more numerous family gets more. I asked what part each puts in the pot. "Accordingly, what we have" said Mavis. From what they said in the long conversation which ensued it seems that there is no question about the family are not mean". I do not know yet how it is with the food which has to be bought like meat, sugar etc. This I will investigate at the next visit. They all were so eager to impress me that they "live good" that I felt I wouldn't get an objective answer.

Family ties. Sarah sees seldom her brothers and sisters. She stays mostly at home but sometimes they visit each other, especially those who live in Bottom. Sarah's children come often to her. Her late husband planted for each child and for Sarah a breadfruit tree. Sarah pointed each tree and told for whom it was planted. When the trees bear the respective "owner" comes and picks the fruit.

Means of support. Sarah avoided the question of the land, perhaps because she didn't want to tell about the dispute between her two sons. The land is the same which her husband got from his father. This is divided among her sons. She didn't mention daughters. (which doesn't mean they didn t get a share too). Grafton works the land. He works also on the field of a neighbour Mr. Burnell Powell. He is working there to-day. I couldn't get a clear answer to the question whether Reggie Swaby pays any kind of rent. She kept on saying "We live good together" so I had to drop the subject. For the same reason I didnxx wasn't able to get a picture of how the work of the three women is divided, but will tackle it from a different angle next time. Anyhow all the household activities seem to take place in the yard of Sarah. The house of Crafton was shut and Lydia with the smaller children was at her mother in law yard. Lydia said that the three elder children Mervin, Mel wa and Sydney were at school.

-Sarah thanked me for the visit and invited to come again. I asked whether she was not tired after so many questions, but she said "I like to talk with you Missis". She has gentle manners and a savoir vivre which very often is lacking among middle aged women and especially young

girls.

Sarah Simpson. Sarah's parents: Elizabeth Roye and Aaron Rochester. Her brothers and sisters living in B.S.; James and Aaron Rochester /in B.S., Old Top Side/, Henry /died/, Mehala Thompson, Frederica Thompson, Judith Ellictt, Fannie Thompson /died/. Her hushand Richard Simpson was son of Robert and Ellen Simpson. Her children: Crafton, with her; Wilbert - in Bottom; James - in Bottom; Egbert - died; Martha - married to Izand Simpson in Shadock Hill; Hilda Dyer /married, in Ridge/; Isobelle Plummer xx and Esthel Hall, both married, living in Kingston.

Clarke Clide. Clarke Clide is son of Crafton's sister Esthel Hall and William Clarke of Kingston. He is adopted by Sarah and Crafton, living with them, but supported by his parents.
