Land & House.

Owns 4 acre on which her house is built. Her father gave is to her while he was yet alive. He has other land. He died '35, but his land is not yet divided among the children.

House was built by husband. - Cecil Powell. He died '39. Edith had 2;000 tomatoe plants. She did not say how much she made from her garden. "Me draw it (money) and use it a'ready."

Charles Brooks - a nephew of Edith's asked if he would be getting tickets forgo America, if he gave me his name. Asked if he ever went to America. "Them don give we the poorer one them any ticket. Teacher Millard give to chosen people who can help themself. Them sell the ticket. As soquick as you can hear say it come, you hear say it done."

Stanlye Brooks - brother of Charles Brooks. said "Suppose me name go in a book, and when it come out, me hear me owe

£27, me no want me name go in a book for me have bad luck. Asked if his father Luther had a few acres of land. "No, but all a we cotch up on the piece a lan' The fastest worker work the hardest. Hicksford, another brother works on the same land. Luther owns about 2½ acres.

Stanley said "tomatoe money draw and done long time. Charles go a Town and mash up the whole a fe him own. Stanley drew £7. He owed £4 to the company. "So me only get £3." After clearing expenses Luther made £8.

Asked Stanley if he intended to buy land. "All like the land, we afi go live in a wood.

The children played happily all the time. One of the children had a maschette. Edith told himto put it down. Charles said "Move from de, you look so old and ageable. (the child was about 4 years old) The best thing you do, unoo chop up oneanother."

Visiting Edith's yard I found a group of boys and girls sitting in the kitchen. There were Juney Elliott from a neighbouring yared, Crofton Brooks father of Hermin's child, Hexford Brooks cousin to Hermin, Nicholas Banton, and Beryl Powell.

Juney was pecling cassava from a basket, Berrinwas looking after the fire. Grofton was lying on a piece of board, while the other two were sitting down. Edith was not at home and Hermin the bagger sister had gone on an errand, and would be back soon.

Juney and the boys were talking in whispers and every now and then gave a little laugh. They were all in a humorous mood. Juney & was through with the cassava peeling and was calling out to Beryl to look about the fire. Beryl had no intention of looking about the fire, because she was anxious to hear what I was going to talk about.

At the same time Beryl pointed to wards the hill and said "see Hermin day come day ". Hermin came up and said ggod morning. She had in her hand several pieces ofx thread that she/kaxxxxxx to beg at the next yard, her uncle's yard - uther kax Brooks.

Hermin was in a gay mood, "me dey go a Pedro go spred meself". Asked what was happening at Pedro? Hermin laughed, Juney said"a because she ha go make she laugh". "Who tell you say me na go, me gwine go get sea -bath. But you no should a carry out one six pence fe gi' the po you caan look 'pon the whole a we and see say we poof".

Crofton said "as a man hungry you caan fin' no restiplace, put in dey say Crofton say, Crofton dey dead fe hungry ". Beryl said "this ya' man, pointing to Nicholas a married man though Maa'".

"Juney him maddie maddiethough you caan follow him ya (maddie, means stupid, not sensible). Duppy did thie him way carr' gwine a bush fetwo day, a it make him focl fool so ".

Juney's story.

Juney was born in allards Valley. Her parents are Albert Elliott and Derenda Elliott. They came to live in Bull Savannah in 1940. They are living at Top Bull Savannah. "Them set duppy 'pon me fah one day me one go in the woods, go look wood, and while me was chapping the wood me w just feel the whole place get hot and one big whiteness cover me ".

"Me bawl out and me never know nothing else, tillme find me self into one cave. Whem me come to me fin' me mother, Beryl Brooks and leveland Brooks stand up over me ". Juney was in the woods for twodays before her people could find her. When she went to look the wood her motther noticed she stayed longer than usual, so the mother and some other people went off to look for her. She was not found until the second day that she went.

She was taken to Miss Reta's Balm at Blakes' Pen , and Miss Reta "tell me parents that a duppy them set 'pon me and them mus' go seek out fe see if them can get it off, f she dont take off duppy ". They tooks her to another Bal at Rocky Point to a man by the name of Cleveland Edwards. Cleveland gave them pills and medicine and charged them £31. O. O. . . Her parents paid £30. O. O. "and tell Cleveland that him na get the other one, him say is alright".

"A one man name William Turner did set the duppy 'pon me, because him dld want me fe married to and me no did love him for him no did pretty nor have money. Him no did have house nor land and when me married to him me would a a hve fe go stan' up under coconut tree. A pretty man me want wey have something, with him mouth full a gold. Me gwine go take out me teeth and put in gold that me teeth can shine 'pon the boy them ".

Edith's Husbands

Cecil Powell Edith's husband is dead . Edith had three children for Cecil before they were married . Edith and Cecil were not living together at the same house . Edith was living at her parents' home when she had the two first thildren , Hermin and Menneth . At that time Cecil was living at Tadd Town .

Cecil built the house Edith and the children are now living in . Edith and Cecil moved into the house before Beryl was born . Edith left her parents home then , becau they had made their ownglittle home" . They were married before Cecil junior was born and about one year after Cec was born the father died .

After the death of the father, while Cecil was still a baby Edith and Claston Roy became friends. They contitue their friendship for about two years and then they "bre off for Claston a married man". Edith has one child for

Claston . Edith and Claston were not living together in one house "laston only go and come ". After parting with Claston, Edith and Cleveland at McDonald became friends. leveland was living at Tadd own, but he is now living at Edith house. Edith has four children for Cleveland. Cleveland started to live at Edith's house in 1942.

Land & Cultivation.

before he died. Her parents left one acre and a half of land over the old yard for all the a children. The land is not divided, all the children work im in common. The parents also left nine acres in the swoods for the girls, but/kim does not know how much is fx left for the boys. That is where her mother does some of her cultivation

Her mother does not cultivate largely. She plants "little of every thing, cassava, gungo, french bean and corn". Her mother sells the most of the french hean, and uses the other things for the home use. Hermin and Kenneth help their mother to cultivate. Cleveland, Narman does not help Edith to cultivate, he plants for himself. Cleveland works on partnership with David Brooks and Arthur Simpson, planting tomato, corn, cassava and peas. Cleveland and his partners share the crop in cash and kind.

Hermin.

To make a living "ermin does a "little trading ". She trades on lobster and fish . She buys the lobster and fish at **Xtigxtsxxxxxx Little Pedro and she sells them in the neighbouring Districts . She has been trading for three years . "It no pay too bad , but it this can help me fe live ". She goes to Little Pedro three times for the week, Monday, Wednesday, and Saburday.

Hermin had two children for Crofton Brooks from Top
Bull Savannah, one is dead and one is alive. Crofton is
supporting the child. Crofton does not live at Hermin's
house, but he visits her sometimes. They arexative still
friends.

Kenneth.

Kenneth is doing fishing with Sydney Banton at Alligate Ponda . Sydney has his own boat , but he does not charge Kenneth for using the boat . Kenneth has his own pods , so Sydney does not pay Kenneth for working with him . They go to sea three times for the week . When Kenneth does not go to sea he helps his mother with the cultivation .

Beryl .

Beryl does not kiers live at her mother's house . She is staying with her uncle Percival rooks . Her uncle took

her last year from her mother, " me uncle take her fe help me mother because me mother have planty children". She goes to school from herm uncle's yard, and helps to do every little thing in the home.

Expenditure.

For a week Kermin and he rmother sometimes spend in the shop seven shillings, apart from the Saturday market " which may give a total of 15/ and sometimes mark more. There are times when they have to spend 7/- for food only, and at other times a little less. "We have fe buy every thing, every minute we have fe send gone a shop.

Hermin has to help to provide for herself, she gives her mother whatever she khas whether money or food. For health they spend sometimes £6. 0. 0. or £3.0. 0. "or any amount according as any body sick. Sometimes we dont even have fe spend so much". Clothing for a month cost Hermin £3. 0. 0., but me mother she have a fe buy more for she have plenty children. Now and then me help her for is only maxene me have". Schooling does not cost her mother so much as yet for "is only two a k the pichney going a school and them just start".

House.

The house was built by Hermin's father. She does not know how much it most to build it. "It though cost more for it day break down and we no have any money fe work 'pon it for we poor ". he house had one room, which is very small to accommodate the members of the house hold. The walls of the house are breaking down, and makes the apearance of the house very shabby.

The kitchen is a crude little building of sticks and coconut leaves .

The kitchen is just a little hut made of coconut leaves with thatched roof.

Source of living

tivates all the time. Once she used to trade on fish, but she has stopped that "long time now". She plants her food on the land that she lives on, and on the land in the woods. She plants about 2,000 roots of tomato, alittle yam, cassava, and peas, and also a little corn. "Wha' things we plant a this fe we eat. She has no one to help her with her cultivation, she has to/stop her little son Cecil, who is just ll years old to help her weed and plant. " Me have fe stop him from school fe help me work" She sells the tomato that k she plants.

She grew with her mother and father. She went to school and read to the 5th standard. "Me never go and w work any where, me parents them/want me fe go, so me stay home with them all the thimx time". She became friends with Cecil Powell. Cecil asked her parents for her and they consented. Soon after they became friends, "me fall fe him. Me mother never play fe quarrel, but Cecil promise fe married to me, so them never quarrel fe too l long". She had two children for Cecil before they were married.

She and Cecil were married at the Alside Church in Ballards Valley by the Rev. Ashton. After the was married she went to live at the house that her husband built, where she is now living.

Edith loved her husband ve ry much, "no ask if me love him, me love him up to now, me love him very grave. After him did so good to me and me never xx have fe work so hard fe me self. Her husband died ten years ago from "Malaria Fever". He was a fisher man, "use to fishing at Alligator Pond, but the fever take him, and he couldnget better".

After the death of her husband she and Claston Roy

became friends, but she never lived at Claston's house. She has one child for Claston, the child is Merton. Claston supports the child "simple x enough " When he has any thing he gives the child.

Cleveland McDonald

Her next common law husband is Cleveland McDonald. Cleveland is from Tadd Town. After they got to ber friends Clevland came to live at her house. They were living together for six years, "but we never 'gree so much, we quarrel all the time, fa him run up and down with too much woman. So we part now, we part from January, but him did dey still come a the yard. Him stop xxx now, me hear that him and one woman from Tryall live. Me no know the woman though, a so me hear".

Edith is living by herself now. She has four children for Cleveland. They are Clyde, Nebert, Dotsie, and Belvie. Cleveland supports the Children that Edith has for him still.

Beryl

One of Edith's daughters, who was staying at her uncle Percival Brooks' house is now at back at her mothers house. "Her uncle no did say take her, him did only dey keep them other one company, when the uncle children them did sick dey a hospital with Typhoid Fever. She use to help Miss Hilda do any thing, whenshe havefe go takk look fe the children! Beryl went to school and read the the 5th s standard. Beryl does not work "after him caan get any thing fe do". She analy helps to do the home work.

Alsie

Amother of her daughters is staying with her aunt, Mrs Verona Logan in Manchester. Verona is sister to Edith. Verona took Alsie from Edith to help her "after me have so much a them. Alsie has been staying with her aunt for two years. She is going to school, and her aunt supports her.

Condition of the family

Life is very hard with Edith. The children look hungry and starved. Drinking a coconut/that was offered to me at William Brooks, Edith's children greedily ate the meat of the coconut. After finishing the meat they dug into the shell of the shell, as if they could find more to eat in the shell. It waspast lunch time, and there was no sign of any thing to eat. The children unable to find ripe mangoes on the tree, ate the green ones.

The children though not well fed, were quite merry, and playing with one another.

at Edith's/ yard / They were told to behave themselves, but they did not hear so quickly. They had to be told over and over before they they would stop. Immediately they stopped they startde xgx thayx again. They shouted at one another, hit one another, screamed and laughed, and were in quite a frolissome mood.

They were very dirty and painted all over with mango. Their hands and faces, and the front of their clothes were a mask of dark brown. Each child had on only a dress, and no under garment.

What they are than taught

The children are taught to wash up themselves, but so as to doit well, mother or big sister has to help. Maxene Nebert, and Dotsie can x use the chimmey by themselves, but Belvie cannot.
