Informants John Linton, Arthur Linton, Deloris Rochester.

His house on Junder Hill near Arthur's Linton. Lot of fruit trees round the buildings - many bananas and plantains. The house waxx under zinc roof, was getting a coat of paint for the coming Christmas.

Family, and land
John Linton considers himself- and introduced himfirst cousins - bwo brothers sons and trace their origin to the same white grandfather - " white poor man from England" who first came and settled here. It was John who inherited through his father (Arthur being ill gitimate) the grandfathers land. John says he bought himself a few acres, "below the factory" This part he rents to Major Moxsy who has a prentvxx tobacco plantation. Major built there a very big tank for water.

> The three children who are registered in the census as his grandchildren are - according to Deloris - his adopted children. He has a "big son" who however left home long ago. Deloris who is 17 has never seen him. This son is somewhere - perhaps in Kingston - and "intends to come and visit his father" but has not found the opp portunity yet.

His wife Rebecca is sister of Laban Rochester. Thus she is by marriage the aunt of Judith "ochester xmax who again by marriage is her sister-in-law.

John L'nton is a big grower of tomatoes. Last year Farming. he planted about ten thousand "trees" and this year he has about fifteen thousand. A lot of it he plants "on shares" i.e. he supplies land and plants and so mebody does the work.

As far as he can remember back tobacco was planted in this parts, and only since tomatoes started it isnt the main cash crop any more. Linton prefers tomatoes to tobacco. He thinks one gets more from an acre. Besides tobacco price was fluctuating. There was once a good price - during the first world war - 4/- a pound, but since it dropped to a few pence and the price is always changing so it is not possible to estilate the value of the crop.

In his young days there was a lot of horse raising, but since the introduction of cars there is no money in it any more as horses are not in demand. He keeps occasionally one mare or two but only for his

own use, and breeds mules.
